The Town of Midland might lease to a third party some land it is negotiating to buy.

The land being discussed could become, combined with land already owned by the municipality, a parking lot of 38 parking spaces.

Mr. Spencer, who last lived at 719 Fifth Avenue in Port McNicoll, Ontario, passed away at Huronia District Hospital after an illness which lasted six months.

He was born in Denton on Tyne, England to parents Louise Wooley and John Spencer.

He attended school in Lloydminster and also attended university in Alberta.

He married Sheila Kelly and previously the late Edith Stubberfield. He lived in Port McNicoll for 62 years.

Mr. Spencer was a marine chief engineer, who sailed on the ocean for four years and on the Great Lakes for 46 years. He spent a total of 26 years as a chief engineer. Sixteen years ago, he retired.

Mr. Spencer, who was wounded overseas in 1915 at the Battle of Somme, Belgium, was later a member of the Royal Canadian Legion.
