Every week another 60 The provincial govern- households in Penetang decide to join in the area's recycling program.

That's according to recycling manager Liz the Downer, who gave a report to the North Simcoe Waste Management Association last week.

Increasing the pick-ups from monthly to weekly was "definitely worthwhile doing," she said.

Also, Port McNicoll has seen an increase of 20 households every week

Meanwhile, the association is starting to run low on its supply of blue recycling bins. Almost 7,000 have been given away so far, and it is expected there will be "not too many left by the end of this month," according to Downer.
