Apply now for Access Fund

The first deadline for community organization applying for grants from the \$15 million Access Fund falls on Dec. 31, 1987.

This Access Fund-which will provide \$15 million over three years for eligible renovations-is a joint program of the Office for Disabled Persons and the Office for Senior Citizens' Affairs. After the first Dec. 31 deadline, there will be four more-April 1, 1988; Oct. 1, 1988; April 1, 1989; and Oct. 1, 1989.

vides matching grants of up to \$50,000 to community organizations for renovations to their premises that improve physical access for disabled people and seniors. Examples of such renovations grab bars, alert and emergency systems, signs that are three-dimensional or in braille and changes to structural features such as widening doors.
