Graham Jowett of Midland pleaded guilty to four drug charges and to possession of property obtained by crime, in Barrie in court next on July 28, for on June 13.

Jowett, 40, of Playfair Avenue, was charged last August by the RCMP. Marijuana which police said was worth \$2 million was confiscated from seven fields in five Simcoe County townships.

Graham Jowett was charged with cultivation of a narcotic, trafficking in a narcotic, two counts of possession of a narcotic for the purpose of trafficking, and possession of property obtained by crime.
