House breakins on the rise

Six break-ins in one week at Midland businesses is not "really unusual," according to a police spokesperson.

That's how many there were the week before last. But overall, break and enter crimes in businesses are down substantially this year. There were 60 by the end of August in 1987. But as of last Thursday, there were just 39 in 1988.

However, almost twice as many homes have been broken into in 1988. Last year just 24 had been reported as of Aug. 24, but so far this year 47 homes have been broken into.

Last week there were three more break and enter crimes at Midland businesses. On Aug. 23, Central Marine reported a break-in with more than \$600 stolen and \$200 damage to the building.

On the same day, Uptown Billiards reported a break-in. Although police say there was no damage, \$150 was taken.
