## Street names may change

A review of Midland street names provides no clue that Indians were the first inhabitants of Huronia. Midland Mayor Al Roach feels this vacuum should be filled.

Don Pratt of Trillium Homes Inc. told the mayor earlier this month that he is receptive to naming streets in the Trillium subdivision (in southeast area of the town) along a Native theme.

(Eventually, a new road through the subdivision will connect two of the town's major arteries, William Street and King Street. The subdivision is being built in sections.)

Meanwhile, the developers of a 278-acre plot of land south of Midland's Little Lake also gave a nod to local history when they chose the name Evergreen Heritage Community for their project. The adjacent portion of Highway 12 (now named Heritage Drive) is known

by older residents of Midland as Evergreen Road.

The mayor has called for more street names reflecting Huronia's Ojibwa and Iroquois heritage. He introduced the subject of Indian street names after Pratt mentioned that the length of Manly Street where his company is working will be renamed Galloway Boulevard.

## Money

Midland and its neighbors are expecting to get money from the provincial government to offset the cost of garbage disposal.

Midland is expecting \$140,000. Whatever amount is forthcoming through the Ministry of Municipal Affairs will be marked for the town's 1989 garbage disposal budget.

# FLEC gets flak over logo's look

The Simcoe County Board of Education's French Language Education Council came under fire from the Tecumseth area trustee last week.

Betty Aldrich, who chaired the committee which developed the new board logo, warned FLEC

not to "mess with the logo" after learning that the francophones were choosing their own letterhead.

"None of the other committees have their own letterhead," said Aldrich.

Basile Dorion, chairperson of FLEC, hastened to explain: the board's logo

will be used properly, he promised, but FLEC would simply print its name underneath it. FLEC needs

a letterhead, according to one of its members, because it often deals in correspondence separately from the board.
