Heritage day approaches

Heritage Day will be celebrated at Sainte Marie among the Hurons on Highway 12 near Midland. This annual event will be held Feb. 19, with many activities planned between noon and 4:30 p.m. Admission is \$3 for adults, \$2 for seniors, children and Friends of Sainte-Marie.

Outdoor activities, displays, foods and demonstrations from around the world are planned by the Friends of Sainte Marie, who each year sponsor this event. The event is to encourage families to spend the day together having fun and take time to examine and be proud of their particular heritage.

Heritage Day." Community people bring in photos, things to eat and native costumes for all to share.

The outdoor activities planned, weather permitting, include snowshoeing, cross-country skiing as well as a traditional Huron game of strength and skill known as snow snake.

Displays feature different cultures that have settled in the area. Isobel Ball, program co-ordinator, is hoping for a representative from various cultures.

In the cafe, foods will represent the different cultures such as Ukrainian perogies, French

pea soup, haggis from Scotland and perhaps Dutch butter cake.

"The highlight of the day," feels Ball, "will be the heirloom identification display." Experts in their field will bring items such as old postcards, furniture, antiques, stamps, jewellery, china and textiles to display.

Members of the community can bring heirloom pieces and an expert will identify it.

While Heritage Day has been celebrated for some 10 years at Saint Marie, this is the second year for adding cultures.

"Each year we try to add something different," says Ball. "Last year was such a success that the same format is being used again."
