
Russ lost his voice Friday and it became increasinally difficult for him to shout instructions to his teammates.

Kings hang tough before losing 5-3

After two crushing defeats at the hands of the Huntsville Blair McCanns, the Penetang Kings managed to keep the score close, but still lost 5-3 at home Friday.

The Kings scored the first three goals but couldn't hold on as unnecessary penalties cost them three powerplay goals, all in the second period.

The first goal came at 4:42 of the opening period on a two-man advantage for Penetang.

Defenceman Dave Lovering slapped a low hard shot past Huntsville goalie Mike Fountain's stick side, who was screened well by Pat McGowan.

The next goal came just under a minute later, while Huntsville still had a man in the penalty box. Another effective screen play, executed by captain Wayne Desjardins, saw Tim Ansdell's shot from the right wing elude the goalie on the left side.

In the second period, Penetang again took the action to the Huntsville end, scoring in the opening minute.

Desjardins banged this one in on a scramble in front of the net. Jim Cascadden and Pat McGowan were credited with the assists.

Huntsville ace Matt Hoffman scored his team's first goal unassisted, eventually finishing with five points for the night.

Hoffman skated down the left side and fooled Penetang goalie Jim Roberts with a shot to the stick side.

Penetang's Jordy Hulland cost his team a goal a short time later when he hauled down a Huntsville player from behind while heading into the Huntsville zone.

Hoffman struck again while Hulland and another Penetang player cooled their heels in the box, lifting the puck over a sprawled Roberts.

Huntsville also scored the next two on the power play, while Penetang continued to sap their strength with penalties.

Huntsville's Scott Evans got the last marker at 12:53 of the third on crisp passes from Hoffman and Kirk Evans.

The fourth and possibly final game of the best of seven playoff is tonight (Wednesday) at 8:30 in Penetang.

Schmidt-Foster second in Finland
