The Times Paris correspondent says: "Rumours have circulated for the last two days that, after all, the life of Orsini is likely to be spared. To what degree they are entitled to credit I cannot say. I am equally ignorant on what grounds his title to clemency is based more than his companions. His letter to the Emperor, as published in the Monitor with the rest of the proceedings, has produced an unpleasant impression on the representatives of some of the German States, and it certainly will not promote good will between the court of Vienna and that of the Tuileries. It is still the topic of severe remark in diplomatic circles.
