WHEAT.—The supplies to day were small, reaching only about 500 bushels, the sample of which was not of the prime kind. Prices are unchanged, the range extending from 43 3/4 to 53 3/4 per bushel.—5s being paid freely for good shipping wheat. The demand is active and loads move off the market rapidly. Spring wheat is in active request at 4s 4 3/4, and in one case 4s 64 per bushel.

FLOUR is firm and in good demand, generally on speculation, with but few purchases for immediate shipment. Quotations are variously stated as follows:—superfine \$3 80 a \$3 90; fancy \$4 20 a \$4 15 and extra \$4 30 a \$4 30 a \$4 50 and extra \$5 per barrel.
