The military buildings at Mackinac, Mich., have been destroyed by fire. Independence passed off with comparatively very few accidents this year.

There are more prisoners in the Indiana Penitentiary than can be accommodated. The nomination of Prince Napoleon to the Governorship of Algiers, is abandoned.

On the Saginaw river, Mich., in a distance of 25 miles, there are more than 50 saw-mills. Henry James, the noted Theological essayist, arrived from England in the steamer Persia.

They are beginning in Boston to ornament their pulpits and sacrament tables with flowers. The N. Y. Express says peaches and ripe apples are arriving in that city from South Carolina.

Col. Kane, the returned messenger of peace to the Mormons, has very ill of bilious fever at Philadelphia. Correspondents from Kansas say there is no doubt of the almost unanimous verdict of the English bill.
