When the cars stopped at London, a coloured man at the station carned from the boy his position, and elegraphed to his friends at Chatham to nect the cars when they arrive there. As soon as the train reached Charman, a sarty of coloured persons entered the car where Mr. Merwin was seated, and sumnardy emancipated the boy, without stayng to pay the Southern gentleman the value of his property. Some of the American papers state that the parties who took the boy away consisted of a avage mob of three or four hundred persons, a med with revolvers and bowie knives, and indulging in the most demoniacal gestures and expressions. On the other hand, the Chatham Planet states that "There was no riotous conduct, no violence, no threats of violence either against the slaveholder himself or against he officers of the Railway, on the pat of the crowd that witnessed and engaged in liberating the boy." The Planet further says " The boy is now enjoying freedom in accordance with his own desire."
