After the pupils had gone through these exercises, the Warden rose and expressed the great delight which he had experienced in witnessing the precedings of that proceedings of that precise. the Warden rose and expressed the great delight which he had experienced in with nessing the proceedings of that morning. He was quite surprised at the proficiency of the pupils, and said he was sure he expressed the feeling of the whole Council when he said that they not only did not regret the grant they had made to the institution, but hoped they might be able in the future to increase the vote. He warmly thanked Mr. McGann for the interest he had manifested in the instruction of those unfortunate under his care, and said that had it not been for him the subject would, most likely, have been neglected to the present time. Rev. T. S. Kennedy, Secretary of the Institution, addressed the audience somewhat lengthily in its support, testifying to the ability of Mr. McGann, to whom they were entirely indebted for the progress of the school. Before any interest had been taken in the subject of educating the dand dumb of the Province he (Mr. McGann) formed a school without pay or reward, and proceeded to instruct his class thus formed.
