

CRIMINAL STATISTICS.

From the Colonist
George L. Allen, Esq., the Governor of the Gaol, has prepared his annual tabular statements in reference to the prisoners committed into his custody during the past year.

The religious denominations to which the prisoners respectively belonged, are thus stated:—Roman Catholic—479 males and 589 females; Church of England—418 males and 316 females; Presbyterian—105 males and 36 females; Methodist—75 males and 17 females; Baptist—13 males and 2 females; other denominations—8 males and 1 female; of no denomination—22 males and 4 females.

The number of prisoners sent to the penitentiary during the year was—29 males and 6 females; 9 males were sent to the reformatory during the year. No females were sent there.

The table setting forth the number of times each prisoner was committed during the year shows that there were committed once—1003 males and 802 females; twice, 51 males and 42 females; three times, 31 males and 24 females; four times, 21 males and 30 females; five times, 9 males and 18 females; six times, 3 males and 23 females; seven times, 0 males and 16 females; eight times, 1 male and 5 females; nine times, 3 females; ten times, 1 female and eleven times, 1 male and 1 female.

The table showing the relative ages of the prisoners shows that 72 males and 18 females were under 15 years of age; that 151 males and 185 females were from 15 to 20 years of age; that 412 males and 527 females were from 20 to 30 years of age; that 237 males and 231 females were from 30 to 40 years of age; and that 236 males and 104 females were above 40 years of age.

As regards the education of the prisoners, one of the tables shows that 333 males and 348 females could neither read nor write; that 214 males and 358 females could read only; that 512 males and 271 females could read and write imperfectly; that 40 males could read and write well; and that six males had received a superior education.

Of the total number of prisoners committed, 143 males and 84 females were English; 630 males and 712 females Irish; 75 males and 23 females were Scotch; 147 males and 99 females were Canadian; 98 males and 41 females were from the United States; 13 males and 1 female were Germans; 8 males and 1 female were from other countries.

The following statement shows the several offences with which the prisoners were charged:—Common assault—38 males and 7 females; felonious assault—9 males and 3 females; arson—3 males; offering forged notes—3 males and 1 female; burglary—1 male and 1 female; cow stealing—6 males; carrying deadly weapons—2 males; conspiracy—3 males; child desertion—2 females; contempt of court—2 males; detained as witnesses—6 males and 3 females; drunk and disorderly—724 males and 805 females; furious driving—1 male; fraud—1 male; forger—3 males and 4 females; shooting with intent—3 males; disorderly and fighting—4 males and 2 females; larceny—197 males and 71 females; murder—1 male; manslaughter—4 males; desertion—3 males; leaving employment, 4 males; inmates of disorderly houses, 13 males and 16 females; keepers of disorderly houses, 11 males and 5 females; indecent exposure, 1 male; receiving stolen goods, 5 males and 10 females; rape, 3 males; infanticide, 1 female; passing base coin, 6 males and 2 females; obtaining goods under false pretence, 2 males; compounding a felony, 1 male; horse stealing, 4 males and 1 female; selling liquor without license 3 males; conveying liquor to prisoners, 1 male; threatening, 49 males and 24 females; robbery, 6 males and 2 females.

Of the female prisoners there were—married 152; widows, 30; servants, 110; prostitutes 671.

A JEALOUS HUSBAND STABS HIS WIFE ADMIRER.—A stabbing affray, resulting in the death of a young man, occurred on Bay street last evening about seven o'clock.

The assailant was a man named David Johnson, who lately kept a tavern on Queen street, near Good's foundry, and the injured party a young fellow of the name of William Carson, in the employment of Messrs. Worthington Bros. It appears that the parties met on the street last night at the hour mentioned when a quarrel arose between them, Johnson accusing the other, who is a simple man, of being on terms of intimacy with his wife too close to be either agreeable or endurable. Carson denied the soft impeachment, and one word brought on another until several blows were exchanged, Johnson, who probably considered his wrongs too great to admit of the further existence of the 'disturber of his peace,' drew a knife, and after aiming a blow at the hated object before him, took to his heels and fled. The thrust inflicted a wound in the fleshy part of Carson's left arm, from which the blood flowed copiously. He managed to walk, however, to the house of Dr. McIlmurray, who bandaged the limb, and otherwise ministered to the relief of the injured man. The wound is not a very serious one. Sergeant-Major Ferris having been apprised of the summary occurrence, immediately ordered out a couple of policemen to scour the city in search of Johnson. Their efforts in this direction were, however, fruitless; the enraged husband was non est. The constables at length gave up the search until to-day, when renewed endeavors will be made to capture the offender.

THE CITY BELLMAN IN A SCRAPE.—The City Bellman, who occasionally delights the hearts of little boys and girls by parading the streets in all the pomp and grandeur of dazzling civic uniform and cocked hat, got into a scrape last night by inhaling too deeply of the cup that cheers as well as inebriates. He was picked up in a very forlorn and helpless condition on King Street, his head buried in a heap of snow, and nothing visible but his legs, which stood perpendicularly out of the snow pile. The young man who discovered him in this 'fix,' kindly extracted him from his awkward position and gave him in charge of the nearest policeman. He was conducted to the Young Street Station, where he was provided with lodgings until he became comparatively sober. He was then admitted to bail by one of the Aldermen.
