But the death knell of the old Grigs is now pretty well struck, and their political influence and power to tamper with the constitution will become a myth-public opinion is the roughly aroused, and nothing short of a complete exposure of the rotten system by which hundreds can be disfranchised will be any longer tolerated—more than one-third of the whole constituency unopposed, hundreds refused when they presented themselves, hundreds deterred from presenting themselves lest they should be refused; and when in spite of the efforts, tricks, reports and fabrications had recourse to by all the antagonistic Grigs in this Riding, man dug up as it were from the exploded opinions of half a century ago, and stimulated and driven to exertions unvisited to their time of life, unnatural alike to their habits and their natures—I say, when in spite of all this Col. Boreford is able to poll 854 votes, and to tender three or four hundred others which are refused. It is insufficient a new political history is about to commence in North York, and its old rebellious tendencies to be forgotten in the glory of its triumph over its revolutionary antecedents.

Our whole representative system, if based upon the same tactics as those put in practice on this occasion in North York, is rotten at the core, and its ruinable exposition of the opinion of the people can be arrived at through a House of Parliament, sent to legislate for the country by the present system of electing our representatives—I am in favour of North York as a fair specimen of the system in operation throughout the country, then indeed has it become necessary that a change should be made; taking away from every individual the power to tamper with as well as the temptation to violate the purity and freedom of the elective franchise.—Courage then independent men of North York; your representation is rapidly passing from the hands of those who have too long misrepresented you, and a truthful basis will be arrived at for the establishment of your claims to the honest exercise of the franchise, and a system will be established which will cure the corruptions that have crept into every Municipality in the Riding—ever the last formed community amongst the incorporated villages of Newmarket has, it is reported, had its franchise tampered with for political motives, and a dodge is said to have been perpetrated by which from fifteen to twenty persons have been struck from the assessment roll. Men of North York, rally around those who will emancipate you from this disgraceful thralldom; check at this incubus of years; insist upon being permitted to express your voice at your elections, because you are by the present system at the mercy of partisan officials; because by the present system you are deterred from taking the trouble to appear at the poll for fear a port poll clerk or other official should jealously and capriciously all you had no vote. Away with such a system; let us have a registered act by which no man, except through his own neglect, shall be deprived of his vote. Pardon the legislature for a proper act to secure your rights. Do so without delay, and the tyrannical faction who have so long dominated over the Riding of North York in their antiquated and anti-progressive notions, will suffer a political extinction.
