

ELECTORAL DIVISION EAST RIDING OF YORK AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.

From the Globe.

The annual meeting of members of the above Society, took place at Wideman's Inn, No. 1, 6th concession Markham, on Wednesday 18th inst. More than usual interest appears to have been taken in the proceedings, and a much larger attendance than was ever witnessed at any of the old county Society's meetings. At eleven o'clock the President called the meeting to order, and read the report of the past year's proceedings. Several of the speakers expressed strong disapprobation of the conduct of the Secretary of the Board of Agriculture, Toronto, who it was asserted had interfered in matters foreign to his duties. A deputation was appointed to wait upon the directors of that board, and bring the same under their notice.

To the Members of the East Riding of York Agricultural Society:—

The officers and directors beg to hand in a report of their proceedings, for the past year for your consideration and approval.

First.—List of names of all members of the Society, the amount paid by each set opposite his name.

Second.—The names of all persons to whom premiums were awarded, the amount of such premiums respectively, and the name of the animal, article or thing, in respect of which the same was granted.

Third.—The financial report of receipts and disbursements during the year.

On assuming office, the directors found in the hands of their Treasurer, the sum of \$190 30, of which there was due to exhibitors \$22, leaving for the use of the Society, the sum of \$168 30, to which was added for subscriptions \$133, deposit from the Townships of Scarborough and Markham, the sum of \$140 each. There was also received for tickets at the autumn show sale of \$14 tickets at 10 cents each, the sum of \$14 00. The amount received from Government \$479 98, making all together the handsome sum of \$2,202 44, out of which there was paid for advertising account for 1858 \$4 72, for spring ploughing match \$115, and for premiums awarded to bulls and stallions \$37, together amounting to \$156, extent of premiums awarded in the spring. Returned to McKinnon entrance money \$2. Expenses at Spring Fair \$5. Prizes awarded at Fall Fair \$515. Advertising account \$46 80. Rent and other expenses \$7 50. Proportion returned to Scarborough in terms of amalgamation \$95, postage &c. \$5, together amounting to \$973 02, leaving in the hands of the Treasurer \$229 42 of the funds of the Society, also the sum of \$9 due to exhibitors for 1858, and \$26 due to exhibitors for 1859, a gratifying result of the year's proceedings. This Society held a show of bulls and stallions and one ploughing match in the spring to which the township of Scarborough Agricultural Society contributed the sum of \$4, the members of that Society having like privileges with members of the Electoral divisions, the directors of both Societies having equal voice on that occasion. The show of bulls and stallions was meagre, but the animals exhibited were of a superior description. The ploughing match was one of the best ever held in the county. 29 entries were made, the competition was keen, and the work performed of the best description, the judges on the occasion having experienced very great difficulty in deciding to whom the several prizes should be awarded.

The autumn show was also held in conjunction with the Township of Scarborough society. The terms on which the amalgamation took place, were, that the Township society should place all its funds at the disposal of the electoral division, the directors of the township society being associated with the directors of the county, and having equal power for that show, and the members of the township being permitted to exhibit, free of all charge. It was also stipulated, that should all the premiums offered not be competed for, the funds on hand after payment of premiums and expenses should be divided *pro rata* to each, and on winding up the business, it was found that the sum of \$95 was due to the Scarborough society, which was handed over to the treasurer of that society, and receipt taken for the same. The directors cannot speak too highly of the very efficient and valuable services rendered to this society by the directors of the Township society in making the necessary preparatory arrangements and working out the whole plan. The fair itself was a most successful one—no less than 492 entries having been made. The display of stock was large and of the best description, showing vast improvements, yearly, being made in cattle, sheep, swine, and horses. Of implements of husbandry there was a very large display, exhibiting a high order of mechanical skill and superior workmanship. Of roots there was an extraordinary supply and of the most satisfactory character, showing the increased interest taken in the cultivation of roots in this county. Gratifying as the display was, it is known that the root crop this year yielded less than an average, the quality being inferior owing to the ravages of the grasshoppers, and other causes.

Of wheat there were exhibited some splendid samples—both spring and fall. The directors rejoice to find that the yield of this crop has been a good average with in the bounds of these two townships. Of other grains, such as barley, oats and peas, there were, also, samples of very superior quality. The directors are gratified to learn that the yield of those poorer grown were good and prices satisfactory.

All which is respectfully submitted.

On motion, Mr. Miller left the chair, and the president elect assumed the same. Votes of thanks were passed to the President, Directors, and Secretary-Treasurer for their efficient services during the past year.

It was moved by ADAM ARMSTRONG, Esq., and seconded by JACOB SNIDER, Esq., that J. P. Wheeler, George Miller, A. Barker, and T. A. Milne, Esqs., be a deputation to confer with the Board of Agriculture as to the proper working of the Act 20 Vic., cap. 33, in its several clauses in reference to Township and County reports and other matters, and to report to the board of directors at an early day.
