On Tuesday the 18th inst., there was an immense gathering on Queenston Heights to witness the Prince of Wales receiving an address from the surviving veterans of 1812. The address was read by Sir John B. Robinson, Chief Justice of Upper Canada, and a reply given by the Prince. At the conclusion of the reply, His Royal Highness was conducted by Sir
