THE YORK TOWNSHIP AGRICULTURAL EXHIBITION.

The annual exhibition of the York Township Agricultural Society was held in Yorkville on Wednesday and Thursday last, and was a very attractive affair. The show in every respect was worthy of the enterprising farmers residing in the township, and afforded much satisfaction to the very large number of persons who visited it.

The annual dinner of the Society was held in the afternoon of the second day. It was attended by about 150 gentlemen, among whom were the Hon. G. W. Allan, M. L. C. Messrs. W. P. Howland, M. P. P., G. W. Thomson, W. Goodenham, G. W. W. Baldwin, G. P. Wheeler, J. H. Scheraga, J. H. Scheraga, Thomas Smith, F. Hussey, Rice Lewis, &c. The chair was occupied by the President of the Society, who, after seeing justice done to the substantial fare provided, proposed the usual loyal and patriotic toasts, which were very warmly received.

The President then gave the health of the Judges, which was suitably responded to by Messrs. Goodenham, Bechell, Wheeler, Musson and Lewis.

The health of the Hon. Mr. Allan was next proposed by the President in a graceful speech, and that gentleman replied in a lengthy address fully explaining the advantages derived by farmers as well as others from such annual gatherings. His remarks were suitably responded to and received an ovation of applause.

Colonel Thomson then addressed the assembly in an able manner, impressing upon the farmers the necessity of supporting exhibitions of this nature, the effects of which were so apparent in the highly improved state of agriculture in this country.

Messrs. W. P. Howland and Peter Hussey followed in lengthy and admirable addresses, offering many valuable suggestions to the farmer and containing information of a highly practical character. The address of both gentlemen were heartily applauded.

This closed the proceedings of the best exhibition that has ever been held in York township.

TORONTO MARKETS.
THURSDAY, October 11.

Wheat.—8000 bushels was the extent of the supply which sold readily at high prices. The price paid for the best samples were from \$1 22 to \$1 32, or bushel, the average being \$1 29, and of the entire sales \$1 28. A large quantity—perhaps the largest—sold at \$1 20. Common grades went off at from \$1 10 to \$1 20 per bushel. Spring Wheat—1,250 bushels in market, which sold at from \$1 02 to \$1 09 per bushel.

Barley.—sold at from 60 to 65c.

Oats.—150 bushels went off at 56 and 60c per bushel.

Hay.—is from \$12 to \$16 per ton. Straw \$5 to \$7 per ton.

Flour.—Superfine No. 2 sold at \$5 15 to \$5 25, No. 1, \$5 to \$5 15; Fancy (Spring) \$5 25 to \$5 30; Fancy (Fall) \$5 40; to \$5 60; Extra, \$5 to \$6 00; Double Extra, \$6 00 to \$6 25.

Butter.—Fresh is in fair supply at from 15c to 17c per lb.

Eggs.—Fresh from wagons 8 to 10c per dozen. Potatoes—New vary in price from 20 to 25c, and sometimes 30c per bushel. Old potatoes, sold at 22c per bushel.

Sheep.—are in demand at from \$3 50 to \$4 50 each.

Lamb.—are plentiful at from \$2 to \$2 50 each. Calves—are in good supply at \$4 to \$6 each. Beef—Hides—\$3 50 per 100 lbs. Sheep and lamb skins 90c each. Calveskins 10c per lb.—Tallow, \$6 1/2 per 100 lbs.
