BOOK POST WITH ENGLAND. - There would appear to exist a misrepresentation on the part of the public as regards the postal regulations governing the transmission to England of Mogazines, Pamphelets, and printed matter of like nature. Many seem to suppose that the rate on Magazines, Books, &c., posted in Canada and addressed to England is the same as though addressed to a destination in the Province, and they pre-pay them accordingly by stamps at one cent per ounce only. would appear to exist a misrepresentation ingly by stamps at one earl per ounce only. This, however, is a mistake. Printed publications other than newspapers are forwarded to England under what are termed Book Post' regulations. These regulations are controlled by the British Postoffice. They apply not only to Canada, but to all the British Colonies. The posbut to all the British Colonies. The pos-

The postage chargeable on a book packet must be pre paid by postage slamps, for if posted unpaid, it cannot be forwarded to the United Kingdom. Persons mailing packages for England, would do well to bear in mind these regulations.

The Owen Sound Times says :- Mr. William Spencer, of Amabel, called upon us on Wednesday, and exhibited a specimen of chalk found in the bed of "Shallow Lake" in Keppel. This lake is entirely dry in the summer; covers about 600 acres and is about three feet deep in water. A large creek fails into it from the north and a smaller one from the south. That at the north sinks into fissures in the rocks, and only floods over the bed of the lake and only libous over the subterrancous outlet cannot carry off all the water. Mr. Spencer states that the chalk lies in a bed under every portion of the lake, about five feet in thickness; resting on a substratum of whitish clay. He thinks it has been of whitish clay. He thinks it has been entirely formed by deposits left by the waters of the lake, from the limestone held in solution.
