

THE STORM.

MANY LIVES LOST!

Below we give advices of the wreck of twenty vessels, with the loss of several crews. We have yet to hear from several other points. The storm was one of the most terrible ever experienced on the lakes.

The schooner William Case, of Chicago, and the N. P. Goodall, of Buffalo, were towed into the river here this morning from Lake Huron, both covered with ice.

The tug Magnet reports that on Sunday night, two vessels, names unknown were in a helpless condition in Plympton Bay, Lake Huron.

PORT STANLEY, Nov. 27. The schooner Stallywag, of Port Dover, went ashore six miles below here on Sunday morning.

PORT COLBORNE, Nov. 27, 6 p.m. The propeller Jersey City, from Cleveland to Dunkirk, with flour and pork, is a total wreck two miles from Long Point.

The schooner Kenosha, lying at anchor off Long Point, was picked up. Five bodies have been recovered. The survivors have their hands badly frozen.

The schooner Sacramento and Cayuga, are ashore here. The Jennie P. Mack is ashore, ten miles above.

There is also a report that a schooner sunk a few miles west of here this morning.

It is rumored that another vessel is ashore at Bayfield. Name unknown.

The steamer Ploughboy left Collingwood ten days ago and has not since been heard from. She had on board but three days provisions.

The following vessels are ashore near South Bay: St. George, Mary, Wild Rover and two or three others.

The schooner Carrier Dove is ashore on Wolfe Island; the Game Cock at Peninsula Point; and Minnehaha dragged both anchors and is ashore near Cape Vincent.

The schooner Marquette is ashore at Nelson's Island; Forest frozen in the ice near Trenton, in Bay Quinte; Jennie P. Mack cargo ashore ten miles above Port Colborne.

The schooner Queen City, of Kingston, boat lost, sails ribbed; propeller Coaster gone ashore eight miles below Stone Mills, Canada.

The schooner Augusta Handy in South Bay, canvas and boat gone, leaking badly.

The schooner Edith, of Oakville, was beached in the gale of Saturday, one mile south of Stony Point.

The schooner Sarah (not Sailor as reported), is ashore on Point Frederick, making water badly.

By a telegram received by Mr. Joseph Doyle, we learn that the following vessels consigned to this port left Port Dalhousie on Friday night, and consequently experienced the gales, viz:

The barque St. George, with a cargo of wheat.

The barque Tornado, with a cargo of corn.

The propeller Avon left Port Dalhousie on Friday evening, and is now in Presque Isle harbour.

Subsequent information received by Mr. J. Doyle states that a compass and boat of the barque Tornado were washed ashore at Sand Bay, head of the American channel near Cape Vincent.

The crew of the Tornado perished, and the vessel is a total loss. The barque was owned by Mr. James Morton, of this city.

A visitor from the wreck of the Tornado who arrived at Kingston on Monday afternoon, describes her as being ashore at Sand Bay, at the head of the channel.

Two large vessels are ashore westward of Stony Point American shore.

The schooner Mary Grover came into port from South Bay on Sunday afternoon. She lost an anchor and was obliged to run for this harbour.

The schooner Mary, of St. Catharines, ashore at Timber Island, having parted her chains, and is likely to prove a total loss.

The steamer Hercules went to the assistance of some vessels lying under Fourmile Point, on Monday morning, and towed into harbour the schooners Ajax and Pioneer, both unable to use their sails in consequence of the accumulation of ice.

TORONTO INSTITUTION FOR THE DEAF AND DUMB AND BLIND.

A meeting in aid of this institution was held in Thornhill on Friday last, the 23rd. The following local committee was appointed: W. Parsons, Esq., F. Paxton, Esq., McDougall, Esq., F. Brunsell, Esq., Puckiss, Esq., R. J. Arnold, Esq., and Stark, Esq., and all the ministers of religion in the place.

INSTRUCTION OF THE DEAF AND DUMB.—At a meeting held in Oakville, on Monday last, in aid of the Toronto Institution for the instruction of the Deaf and Dumb and of the Blind, the following local committee were appointed: G. K. Chisholm, Esq., Mayor, Justice Williams, Esq., J. P.—Barclay, Esq.—Miles, Esq., Urquhart, Esq., James Arnold, Esq., Young, Esq., and all the ministers of religion in the place.

A somewhat singular case has happened at St. Thomas. On the 8th of October last, a man of the name of David Cathers, a well educated man who emigrated to this country from Newtownnadamah, in the County of Derry, Ireland, arrived at this village and stopped with a relative of his of the name of William Bunside.

On Saturday morning last, a large shed upon the Island Wharf, Montreal, belonging to the Champlain and St. Lawrence Railway Company was blown down, and five or six persons, who were in it at the time, escaped unhurt, with the exception of David Fenton, one of the employees, who received some severe contusions.

The other day a French Canadian woman, residing in the neighborhood of Quebec, attempted to elope, carrying with her £30 belonging to her husband, but had only got as far as the Chaudiers, when she was arrested in her guilty flight.

The shipping, with the exception of three or four vessels engaged in the herring and oyster trade, has left the harbor of Montreal, and the docks lately occupied by them have assumed their winter appearance.

The Quebec Chronicle says:—It is reported that Mr. Thompson, the former proprietor of the Toronto Colonist, and one of the oldest newspaper men in the Province, is about to become the purchaser of the Mercury.

The Quebec Gazette believes that the shipping business is likely to be much brisker in Quebec during the coming winter than it was during the past.

The soap, potash, and candle factory, of Mr. Toulson, of Chilton, was burned down on the 19th inst. The building was totally consumed, and there was not an article saved from the destroying grasp of the flames.

As an evidence of the advancing prosperity of the village of Burwick, Vaughan, we observe that a law office has been opened there by Mr. L. Heyden, Barrister, in connection with his town office. The legal business of that neighborhood is large, and we are sure will now be well attended to.

Fall Wheat.—2000 bushels was the extent of the supply which sold at the following prices. The prices paid for the best samples were from \$1 12 to \$1 17 per bushel.

Spring Wheat.—1,250 bushels in market, which sold at from \$0 90 to \$0 95 per bushel. Barley.—sold at from \$0 50 to \$0 55. Peas.—150 bushels went off at 47 and 50c per bushel.

Ons.—at 28 and 31c per bushel. Hay.—from \$15 to \$17 per ton. Straw \$6 to \$7 per ton.

Flour.—Superfine No. 2 sold at \$5 5 to \$5 10. No. 1, \$4 to \$4 80; Fancy (Spring) \$4 90 to \$5 30; Fancy (Fall) \$5 40; to \$5 60; Extra, \$5 to \$5 50; Double Extra, \$6 00 to \$6 25. Butter.—fresh is in fair supply at from 19c to 20c per lb.

Perk.—in fair request. For Hogs averaging 160 lbs \$5 50 and \$6 has been paid, with the average 225 lbs \$6 and \$6 10—the latter being the extreme figures.

Apples.—common varieties \$1 and \$1 25 per barrel. Better grades \$1 50 and \$2 barrel. Potatoes.—New variety in price from 20 to 25c, and sometimes 30c per bushel. Calfskins 10c per lb. Tallow, \$7 75 per 100 lbs. Hay—\$12 and \$16 per ton.
