INTERESTING ANTIQUARIAN DISCOVENY.— The excevation now in progress in the streets of Malton, for drainage, have exposed a section of the Roman road, leading from Dervento to Eburacum (Malton to York). The road has been traced a nistance of 150 yards, and is at an uniform depth of three feet below the present surface, and lies close upon the colite rock. It does not appear to have been paved, but seems more like the modern system of Macadam, and is formed of water-reunided gravel or shingle of the secondary rocks, apparently obtained at same point of the coast. Except a small fragment resembing the Saiman ware, ne pottery has yet been found. At two feet amall fragment resembing the Saiman war, ne pottery has yet been found. On this the soil was nearly bluck, and some beds of ashes were fornd, and the stones bore numerous traces of fire.
