

TIME FOR CUTTING TIMBER.
Messrs. Editors.—You observe that it is the practice to cut nearly all timber in the comparative leisure of winter; but there is no doubt it would be better to pay a higher price to have it done in summer. In the matter of the softer woods, whether for lumber or fuel, their value is very largely increased if they are worked up at once, as you observe. When I came upon this farm some years ago we were wanting some rails to finish a division fence, and cut and split them in the odd moments, too cold or too wet for other work, in the month of April. They were of black oak, and sold for three to five times as long as those cut in winter. The tops of the trees were worked up later, perhaps the first of May, for cord-wood, and piled up to season during the summer; and when cut into stove-wood the next winter, we found it the best and brightest wood we ever burned—equal for fuel or any hard-wood cut in winter. I have no doubt that any soft wood cut early in summer, and split and dried at once, would make fuel equal for heating purposes to the common run of hard-wood brought to market.
