

Diphtheria in now occupies a distinct line in the tables of mortality in England. The progress of this epidemic has been very rapid. In 1855 the deaths were 293; in 1856, 603; in 1857, 1,583; in 1858, 6,617; and in 1859, 10,184. Dr. Guilmette, of New York, states that a fatal termination of the disease may be prevented by making an incision in the windpipe.

Is a Widow a Married Woman?—This inquiry was indirectly decided in the affirmative by the House of Lords recently, on an appeal from the Court of Chancery in the case of Clark vs. Mitchell. The point raised was, whether the word "unmarried" meant "not having a husband or wife living at the time of death." The Court of Chancery had decided in favor of the former definition, and the Lords, presenting equally divided, the decision of the Court below was affirmed.
