

WRECK AND LOSS OF LIFE.—We learn by telegraph, from Antigonish, that a vessel, supposed to be from Canada, lies sunk off Cheticamp, Cape Breton, with the rail discernible from the shore at low water; name unknown. She is breaking up; and seven hundred firkins of butter, and three dead bodies have been washed ashore. No sailing vessel left Montreal last fall with so large a quantity of butter as 700 firkins.—Commercial Advertiser.
