ARRIVAL OF THE "CITY OF NEW YORK"

SANDY HOOK, April 22. The steamship City of New York, from Liverpool on the 9th, via Queenstown, 10th instant, has arrived off this point. Her dates are four days later than those already received.

The steamship Africa arrived at Liverpool on the 8th inst. The new steamer Ovieto, built for war purposes, had left Liverpool for Palermo. It was believed she would go to Bermuda for an armament, and cruise in the Atlantic ocean as a Southern pirate.

The schooner Sophia had run the blockade at Charleston and arrived at Liverpool with 9,000 bales of cotton.

The political news is unimportant. Breadstuffs steady and unchanged. Provisions quiet and steady.

LIVERPOOL, April 21.—Breadstuffs—Flour, active and steady. Wheat, dull and steady. Corn, quiet. Beef, quiet and steady. Pork, quiet and tending downward. Bacon and Lard, quiet and steady.

LONDON, April 21.—Breadstuffs, dull and steady. Sugar, downward. The steamer Ovieto was built at Liverpool, nominally a war vessel, for the Italian Government.

She left on the 22nd of March in ballast, for Palermo, with a crew of 50 men. It is believed she will go to Bermuda. She is built to carry guns of the heaviest calibre, measures 750 tons, and is reported very fast.

The Suter was still at Gibraltar, and the Tascara at Algebras on the 3rd. The ship Keosage, after a two days' visit to Gibraltar, left Algebras for the west on the 1st.

Important changes in the tariff were reported to be proposed to the new Chambers.

The Spanish Government again reiterated its firm determination to abstain from any demonstration prejudicial to the independence of Mexico.

The Danish Rigstad voted an extraordinary credit of one million rigsdalers for iron-plated vessels.

LATEST. QUEENSTOWN, April 10. The Government has contracted with Messrs. Samuel for an iron clad cupola ship, under Captain Cole's invention, to be ready for sea June 1st, 1863.

Experiments at Shoeburness, with a gun of large size, showed that the best and hitherto considered invulnerable forms of iron sides were, so to speak, almost as easily penetrable by a shot as if the targets had been made of timber.

Sir William Armstrong says that a gun of twelve tons weight, fired with a charge of 50 pounds of powder, will break through the sides of the Warrior or the strongest ships afloat.

A target, like the Warrior's sides, was shattered into crumbs at the trial. The Times lays no weapon of offence or defence arms left to us so effective as large armor-clad ships, and very swift steam rams.

BEPLIN, April 11. Measures are reported to be preparing against the Press.

It is officially announced that there is no difference of opinion between the Ministers.

COPENHAGEN, April 11. The Augsburg Gazette asserts, on reliable authority, that England has succeeded in drawing Spain to her side on the Mexican question, by a promise not to object, should Spain take possession of Haiti.

and uprightness is beyond a doubt, and he feels the fullest confidence that he will be fairly dealt with.

He wishes to know the rate of interest charged, and is probably informed by the obliging secretary that it is about 7 per cent; and the privilege of repaying the debt by monthly or quarterly instalments, is held out as a peculiar advantage.

For we are informed in the prospectus already referred to, that 'no individual mortgage would accept' the small periodical payments in which loans are repaid to this society.

He does not consider the percentage at all unreasonable; and in view of his necessities it may to him be worth far more. He borrows \$1000 for 4 years, and gives a mortgage on his farm as security.

The four years' interest is added to the principle, and the amount, (\$1,280) is divided by 48—if the payments are to be monthly—and the sum thus indicated is paid in every month until the whole is paid up.

As the instalments are paid in advance, the first one is deducted from the principle; so that in reality the borrower does not receive \$1000, but this sum, minus the first instalment, or about \$973.34.

Every month he continues to pay in \$26.66 till the end of the four years, or rather till the end of 3 years and 11 months, for the last payment will be made one month before the end of the time.

The debt decreases regularly every month, while interest is charged on the whole sum for the entire period. At the expiration of two years \$666.50 will have been repaid, while interest is still charged on \$1000.

Thus it will be seen that the borrower actually pays for the use of money he has never received; for what he has already returned as well as what he retains; and he likewise pays a month's interest after the entire debt is liquidated.

After investing his loan in such a way as to yield a handsome profit over and above the interest he thinks he is paying, he is astonished to find himself unable to meet his payments.

Instead of borrowing money, as he was led to believe, at the reasonable rate of 7 or 8 per cent, he discovers to his sorrow that he pays 16 or 18 per cent at least.

Hundreds have in this way become bankrupt, who would never have thought of borrowing money from a building society had they known beforehand the enormous interest they would be required to pay.

We might name a dozen at least, who, from this cause, have been entirely ruined; who, after years of industry and toil, have seen their property sacrificed and themselves reduced to want.

This is a matter that calls loudly for legislative interference, and any of our representatives who will come forward boldly and endeavor to remedy the evil, will confer a real benefit on the community, and save many a worthy man from being involved in hopeless embarrassment.
