BRILLIANT WHITEWASH.

Take half a bushel of nice un-slacked lime, slack it with boiling water, cover it during the process to keep in the steam, and add to it a peck of clean salt, previously well dissolved in warm water; three pounds of ground rice, boiled to a thin paste, and stirred in boiling hot; half a pound of clean glue, which has been previously dissolved by first soaking it well, and then hanging it over a slow fire, in a small kettle with a large one filled with water. Add five gallons of hot water to the whole mixture; stir it well and let it stand a few days covered from the dirt. It should be put on right hot; for this purpose it can be kept in a kettle portable furnace. It is said that about one pint of this mixture will cover a square yard upon the outside of a house, if properly applied. Brushes more or less small may be used, according to the neatness of the job required. It answers as well as oil paint for wood, brick or stone, and is cheaper. It retains its brilliancy for many years. Coloring matter may be put in, and made of any shade you like. Spanish Brown stirred in will make red or pink more or less deep, according to the quantity. A delicate tinge of this is very pretty for inside walls. Finely pulverized common clay, well mixed with Spanish brown before it is stirred into the mixture, makes a lilac color. Lampblack in moderate quantities makes a slate color, very suitable for the outside of buildings. Lampblack and Spanish brown mixed produce a reddish stone color. Yellow ochre stirred in makes a yellow wash—but chrome goes further, and makes a color generally esteemed prettier. In all these cases, the darkness of the shade will of course be determined by the quantity of coloring used. It is difficult to make a rule, because tastes are very different; it would be best to try experiments on a shingle and let it dry. It is said that green must not be mixed with lime. The lime destroys the color, and the color has an effect on the white wash which makes it crack and peel. When walls have been badly smoked, and when you wish to have them a clean white, it is well to squeeze indigo plentifully through a bag into the water you use, before it is stirred in the whole mixture. If a larger quantity than five gallons is wanted, the same proportions should be observed.

IRISH BRAVERY AND HONOR.—On the surprise of the Cremona, by Prince Eugene, 1702, when Villeroy, the French general, most of the officers, military chests, &c., were taken, and the German horse and foot in possession of the town, except one place only, the Po Gate, which was guarded by two Irish regiments, commanded by O'Mahony and Bourk, before the Prince commenced the attack there, he sent to expostulate with them, and show them the rashness of sacrificing their lives where they could have no probability of relief, and to assure them if they would enter into the imperial service, they should be directly and honorably promoted. The first part of this proposal they heard with impatience, the second with disdain. "Tell the Prince," said they, "that we have hitherto preserved the honor of our country, and we hope this day to convince him that we are worthy of his esteem. While one of us exists, the German eagle shall not be displayed upon these walls. This is our deliberate resolution, and we will not admit of further capitulation." The attack was commenced by a large body of foot, supported by five thousand cuirassiers, and after a bloody conflict of nearly two hours the Germans retreated: the Irish pursued their advantage, and attacked them in the streets.—Before evening the enemy were expelled from the town, and the general and the military chests recovered.

HOW PONTON BRIDGES ARE MADE.—Ponton boats are flat bottomed, thirty feet long, two and a half feet deep in the centre, two and a half feet wide at the stern, and five feet wide at the bow, and are fitted with a screw gear of four wheels, and is used as a baggage wagon for the pontonniers, carrying its proportion of strong pieces and of plank. On reaching a river the boats are unloaded, floated across by cables made last up stream, then the string pieces are laid across from one boat to the next, and on these are placed the planks, each twenty-one feet long, which form the gateway of that width.—It is a fine sight to see a regiment come to a river bank with a ponton train, unload and launch their boats, move them in a line, and in less than five minutes from the time when the word "halt" was given, have a bridge, say six hundred feet in length, over which an army can safely pass, with artillery and baggage.
