CURING PORK .- A French chem-1st hns lately asserted that seurvy will never arise fron the use of salt provisions, unless saltpetre be used in curring; that salt alone answers all the purposes provided the second data and the second all the purposes, provided the ani-mal heat be entirely parted with before salting. He claims that the insertion of pork in pickle alone is not sufficient, but that it should be rubbed thoroughly with dry salt after it has entirely parted with ani-mel heat, and then the fluid running from the meat should be poured off before packing the pork in the bar-rel. This should be done sufficiently close to admit no unnecessary quar tity of air, and some dry salt should occupy the space between the pieces. and then pickle, and not water should be added. Great care must be taken to fill the barrel entirely full, so that no portion of the meal can at any time project above the surface of the fluid : if this occur, a change of flavor ensues such as is known with rusty pork. The pickle, of course, must be a saturated solution of salt and water, that is so strong that it is incapable of dissol-

ving more salt than hot water. TRANSPLANTING TREES. - Assoon as the foliage has dropped transplant ornamental, shade or fruit trees.-There will be a saving of one year's growth between those planted now In taking and those in the spring. up trees great care should be taken not to mutilate their roots, for every fibre of the root lost, the growth of the trees will be retarded so much and its life endangered. Whenever it is absolutely necessary to part with any of the roots take off the top in proportion. Let the holes be larger than the roots and never bend or cramp a root into a small hole. Where the root is mutilated make a clean cut with a sharp knife, and new rootlets will show themselves pushing out between the bark and wood. If the soil is poor fill the holes with rich earth from the woods swamps. But in no case use stable manure in planting out trees in this climate. Toppress the ground among your trees with leached ashes, or any decomposing vegetable mat-ter. If rabbits are troublesome in barking your fruit trees apply soft country soap to the trunks two or three times in the year.— Scientific
