

The Cholera in India.—The Calcutta correspondent of the London Times says:—With the middle of the rainy season cholera has begun again to decimate the army of the Punjab, the North-western Provinces, and Central India. The plan of moving a regiment out into camp has had little effect in checking the disease, while marching in such weather as this brings on fever and heat-apoplexy. At least 800 men have already fallen victims, chiefly in Lahore, Her Majesty's 35th and Her Majesty's 52nd at Gwalior and Jhansi.

Narrow Escape of a Canadian Steamer.—The Halifax Reporter of November 6th, says:—We have not seen in any of our Canadian exchanges any account of the recent narrow escape of the Canadian steamer Napoleon III, commanded by M. Fortin, inspector of Canadian Fisheries. From a trustworthy informant we learn that on the 13th September last the French war steamer Lavoisier, Capt. Ribourt, whilst cruising in the Gulf, found the steamer in question ashore upon Jacques Cartier Cape. Every means was immediately taken by the French vessel to bring the steamer into deep water again, as the breeze was freshening very rapidly from the North. A good deal has already been done, it may be mentioned here, before the arrival of the Lavoisier by Capt. Ribourt of the ship Active; but all these efforts had been unsuccessful. Owing, however, to the energetic and scientific efforts of the officers and men of the Lavoisier, the Napoleon III, was after some hours of tedious work, once more set afloat without having sustained any serious damage. If it had not been for the fortunate arrival of the French vessel, the Canadian Government, in all probability, would have lost their vessel.

Narrow Escape by a Judge.—The Dublin correspondent of the Times says:—The County of Tipperary certainly contains some of the most daring ruffians in the world. An outrage which for cool audacity surpasses even the conduct of Hayes who murdered Mr. Braddell, occurred at the Tipperary Quarter Sessions on Friday, when Mr. Sergeant Howley, the respected chairman of the county, was very near being wounded on the Bench, where he sat surrounded by twelve magistrates. There were two stipendiary magistrates and thirty constables present, and the court house was densely crowded. A young man about 22 years of age, named Richard Carey, was indicted for stealing two shirts. He paid no attention to the evidence and seemed quite reckless. The jury found him guilty, and it having been ascertained that he had been imprisoned before at Cash as a deserter, he was sentenced to three months' imprisonment with hard labor. The moment the sentence was pronounced the prisoner made a sudden movement, and flung a stone of a pound weight at the head of the judge. Providentially he had not taken his eyes off the prisoner, and perceiving the sudden action, he threw himself back from the chair and thus avoided the blow. The violence with which it was thrown smashed the stone, and a portion of it remained in the woodwork behind the chair. The greatest consternation was excited by this daring outrage. The magistrates held a consultation, and resolved to have the prisoner indicted and tried for his offence at the next assizes. The learned judge was warmly congratulated by his friends on his almost miraculous escape.
