HEADQUARTERS, OPPOSITE FRED ERICKSBURG, Der. 11, 3 p.m. - Between 4 and 5 o'clock this morning, the pontoon train in charge of the 17th and 50th N. Y. Engineers, and under command of Gen. Woodbury, proceeded to the river bank, when an attempt was made to throw three bridges across the river, one at the point where the railroad bridge formerly crossed, and two more opposite the city, but nearer Falmouth.

A dull haze so obscured the movement that, for a time, it was not discovered by the tebel picket. The postcooners had succeeded in partially constructing the bridges, when the rebels suddenly opened Northern Railway of Canada. a very brisk and deadly fire of musketrs from along the banks of the river and the windows of the houses, compelling a cessation of the work. The air was alive with the red messengers of death. Planks and boats were ciddled by every volley.

AMENDMENTS TO THE ELECTION LAW .- The County Council of Kent has adopted a petition to the Governor General arging the necessity of having two polling places in each township at elections or members of Parliament, with a central polling-place for each electoral division; and suggesting further that where the electors number six hundred, for every additional three hundred a third polling place be provided, and that the hours of voting in the day be nine, commencing at eight and ending at five o'clock, when one day would be sufficient to poll overy vote. These amendments, it is claimed, would save unnecesary expense and prevent corruption and bribery.

A telegraphic despatch, dated on the 8th of December, at nine o'clock A. M., from Tiuswille, states that 400,000 gallons of petroleum oil were lost by the ice cutting through the boats on the river on their way to Pittsburg.
