Aurora Council. The eleventh meeting of the Aurora Council was held at Mr. R. Arnold's Hotel, on Wednesday, March 25th, at 7 o'clock, p.m. All the members present. Minutes read and approved. R. Boyd's report on Bowling Alleys, &c.,—asked leave to sit again—granted. A By-law relating to the duties of pound-keeper, and preventing animals running at large, was read a third time and passed. R. Boyd—pursuant to notice laid on the table a By-law defining the duties of Fire Inspector, as amended by the By-law Committee.

R. Boyd moved, seconded by Geo. L. Stevenson, that the Council do now go into committee of the whole on the By-law relating to the duties of the Inspector. The Council then went into committee of the whole. Committee rose, reported by-law as amended, report received, and on motion was adopted.

G. L. Stevenson moved, seconded by J. Holladay, that the Clerk be, and is hereby instructed to notify parties having wood piled on the side walk, on Wellington street, near the station, to remove the same forthwith.—Carried. J. Holladay moved, seconded by G. L. Stevenson, and Resolved—That the Separate School Bill now before the House of Parliament of this province, if passed would be injurious to our Common School System. S. Ashton moved, seconded by J. Holladay, that the Clerk be, and is hereby instructed to forward a copy of the above resolution to the Hon. Adam Wilson, and Hon. Wm. McMaster.—Carried. S. Ashton moved, seconded by J. Holladay, that the Clerk be and is hereby instructed to refer the Council of King and Whitechurch to the Statute relating to the division of funds belonging to the municipalities.—Carried. R. Boyd gave notice that he would, at the next sitting of the Council, introduce a Consolidated Bill for the collection of fines and penalties; also a Bill for the protection of side walks, ornamental trees, and posters in this village. J. Holladay moved, seconded by Seth Ashton, that the Council do now adjourn to meet on Thursday the 2nd of April, at 7 o'clock, p.m., at Arnold's hotel.—Carried.

Mr. Holladay moved, seconded by Mr. Ough, that a committee be formed, composed of Messrs. Field and Peel, to wait on Mr. Mosley, and make arrangements for the ground.—Carried.
