

POLICY OF THE MINISTRY.

REPRESENTATION BY POPULATION ABANDONED BY THE GRITS. (From the Globe, organ of the Ministry and the Ministry-Killer, May 19.)

THE INTERCOLONIAL RAILROAD ABANDONED. We learn with pleasure that the Intercolonial Railroad will receive no countenance from the new Government.

ADMISSION OF ERROR IN OPPOSING THE MILITARY BILL. We need hardly say that the organization of a thoroughly efficient volunteer force, on a scale consistent with the capabilities of the country, will receive prompt and zealous attention.

GOOD NEWS FOR THE BANKRUPT INTEREST. The Bankrupt Law prepared by the Solicitor-General subject to such improvements and suggestions as may be suggested by the mercantile interests will be carried through Parliament without delay.

SUBSIDY TO THE GRAND TRUNK TO BE INCREASED BY \$100,000 A YEAR. We learn also with satisfaction that the Macdonald-Cartier scheme of placing in the hands of irresponsible arbitrators the settlement of the rates to be paid by the Province to the Grand Trunk and other railway companies for carrying the mails, will be totally repudiated.

THE THREATENED 'RE-ADJUSTMENT BILL' IS ABANDONED. The threatened 'Re-adjustment Bill' is abandoned.

ON THE DEBATED EXCISE DUTIES. If we are rightly informed, so also is the much debated excise duty on leather.
