

A THIMBLE-RIG GOVERNMENT

The Halifax Star thus speaks of the late Ministerial defeat:— The leader of the Opposition, in moving a vote of want of confidence in the Sandfield Macdonald Cabinet, declared his belief that the Government had broken faith with the Lower Provinces, in order that office might be retained. Who that in any way cognizant of the course pursued by the Canadian delegates can reasonably raise a question upon this point? Nay, more, has not the Duke of Newcastle—the Colonial Secretary in his despatch to the Governor General of Canada, most distinctly, without circumlocution, charged so much upon Messrs. Sicotte and Howland? Decidedly so. Nor has a portion of the liberal press of the Lower Colonies hesitated to speak out, and not without effect, upon these points. It is a very well for Mr. S. Macdonald to talk now of 'not having abandoned the project.' Why, should he learn to learn, did he fail to back up the Lower Provinces in the consistent and prudent course of legislation which they have perfected?—Simply, in order that office might be retained? We rejoice in this overthrow of a thimble rig Government. What policy the successors of these people may elude out for themselves in respect of this Intercolonial Railway matter remains to be developed; nor, on the whole, do we really feel that the substantial interests of these maritime empires or vice any great extent staked upon the issue.

"Who are the Corruptionists?"—Let us ask Mr. Brown a question. He was once Finance Minister for a few days in 1858; and we desire to know whether he did not improve the time to better his own pecuniary position? How much did he induce the bank of Upper Canada, the keeper of the public deposits over which he had temporary control, to loan to him, during the few days that he was Minister of the Crown? Did he not increase his indebtedness at that bank to the amount of something like \$60,000? And has not that amount, instead of being paid off, gone on increasing till it is now in the neighbourhood of \$70,000? Would any bank have credited him that amount if he had not held the purse strings of the Province, and been in a position to check out the public deposits into some other bank.—Leader.

THE CRIMEAN WAR.—A Parliamentary return was published on Monday morning, giving an account of all the arms, stores, &c., captured at Sebastopol. The estimated value of the whole is £26,000, and the only stores sold are the old flint lock arms, totaling £117 19s. 7d., which was paid into the Treasury. Among the items of these stores are 524 pickaxes, 175 of various sorts and cartridges, 126 cwt. of iron chains, 26 cwt. of copper, 638 cwt. of iron, 1,407 muskets, 1,167 of ordnance, 44 cwt. of rope, and 105,356 shots and shells.

The dead body of a soldier of the 17th regiment named Richardson was found in a bush on the plains of Abraham at Quebec on Wednesday last. He had been missed from his quarters on the previous day, and search being made it resulted in his discovery as stated. An examination of the body disclosed the fact that death had been caused by strangulation and it is supposed that he was murdered by some of the loose characters who frequent the Plains.

Garibaldi has got rid of rheumatic pains in the right arm, which gave him great annoyance and hindered him writing. A Geneva journal says that the wounded foot is rapidly healing, and that the injury received will not in any way interfere with his activity.

The Spanish Government has recently presented through Earl Russell, Captain J. T. White and Captain J. Weeks each with a handsome gold chronometer and chain, valued at 220 guineas, in recognition of important services rendered by them, in November, 1860, to the Spanish war-ship Circe.
