HOW TO CURE HAMS.

After cutting the hams, sprinkle the flesh side with a little salt, and then place them with the skin side undermost on a board also covered with salt, and in this position let them remain for twenty-four hours This first process is for the purpose of extracting the water and blood. The board alinded to should be properly constructed. It should have a rim round it of 3 to 4 inches in height, and by this means tidiness is maintained, and the juices which may ooze from the meat properly collected. The next step is to take a mixture of fine salt and saltpeter and rub the whole hams thoroughly, being careful to see that the ends and shank bones are likewise effectually done. Replace them again in their previous position on the board, and let them remain fully eight days. Coincident or simultaneous with this period, another particular should be attended to, and that is to place a board on the top of the hams, and overlay it with a weight of six to eight stones imperial. 




