

during the recent troubles he was selfish enough to wish the cable might not be laid... But now he wished it every success, as he believed it would do more than any other agency to strengthen the bonds of union between the two countries.

The report of the Hudson Bay Company is ready with regard to the claim of the United States under the Oregon treaty. The hope is expressed that the question may be concluded before the end of the year.

Parliamentary proceedings are unimportant. The business of the session is closing up and will end in about a fortnight.

FRANCE. M. Eloin had arrived in Paris on a special mission.

The weekly returns of the Bank of France show an increase of cash on hand of nearly seventeen million of francs.

The Prince Napoleon was about to proceed to Switzerland. His interview with the Emperor is said to have widened the breach between them.

The Opinions Nationale had received a first warning for an attack upon a government speech in the Chamber.

SPAIN. A general amnesty has been declared for offences against the press law.

The Municipality of Madrid, which was dismissed last April, has been restored. Marshal Serrano has been approved as Captain General of Madrid.

ITALY. Marshal O'Donnell has made a speech in the Cortes, setting forth the government policy, which includes a recognition of the Kingdom of Italy and the maintenance of amicable relations with foreign powers.

IT is reported that the negotiations between the Mexican embassy and the Papal Court have been interrupted and that the embassy will leave Rome, and M. Neghli return from Mexico. Florence papers confirm this rupture.

AUSTRIA. The House of Reichsrath had resolved not to give further credit to the government until the budgets of 1865 and 1866 had been voted, in conformity with the constitution.

It is rumored that M. Von Scherering, minister of the state, and M. Von Plener, minister of finance, had tendered their resignations, which the Emperor declined to accept.

Important Agricultural Meeting.

The Presidents and Vice Presidents of the several Agricultural Societies in the counties of York, Ontario and Peel, met pursuant to previously arranged invitation, on Wednesday the 21st inst., at the agricultural hall, in this city, for the purpose of discussing and adopting such measures as might be deemed conducive to the advancement of their societies and the interests of agriculture generally.

On motion, Mr. Archibald Barker, of Markham, was called to the chair, and Mr. John Shier, of Whitby, appointed secretary.

After some time spent in consultation as to the best time for holding the exhibitions of the several societies represented, it was, on motion of Col. Denison, of Toronto, seconded by Mr. Shier,

Resolved.—That the Fall Shows of the several societies represented be held as follows: South Ontario, 27th and 28th of September; Peel, 3rd and 4th of October; East York, 5th October; Scarborough 6th October; North York, 10th and 11th October; Pickering, 10th October; West York, 11th and 12 October; Whitby, 12th October; Whitechurch, 13th October; Gore of Toronto, 18th October; City of Toronto, 19th and 20th October.

On motion of Mr. Shier, seconded by Mr. Jones, Whitechurch, it was,

Resolved.—That this meeting composed of Presidents and Vice-Presidents of agricultural societies in York, Ontario and Peel, having had under discussion the two bills introduced into the Legislature for the purpose of amending the Agricultural Act, approved of that introduced by the Hon Mr. Alexander, and especially recommends the clause having reference to the election of the members of the Board of Agriculture on the evening of Thursday in the week of the Provincial Exhibition.

On motion of Col. Denison, seconded by Mr. Shier, it was

Resolved.—That in the opinion of the meeting it would be desirable, and to their interests for the township societies to join with the parent society in the autumn shows. First,—because it would add greatly to the prize list. Secondly,—because it would lessen the amount of expenses. And thirdly,—because it would have the effect of reducing the amount of labor of directors and judges.

On motion of Col. Denison, seconded by Mr. Moffat, Mr. Barker was voted from the chair, and Mr. Armstrong of Yorkville having been called thereon, the thanks of the meeting were tendered to Mr. Barker and Mr. Shier for the exertions in bringing about the meeting, and for their zeal in promoting the cause of agriculture.

The meeting then adjourned.

It is reported that the Governor-General proceeds at once to England on leave of absence to rejoin his family. Some surprise has been expressed at this if Parliament is to meet in August, as promised.

There is a set of inhuman charlatans going about the country, applying sulphuric acid to the teeth of their dupes, which, while it gives a temporary brilliant whiteness to the teeth, in a short time ruins them forever.

At St. Louis the other evening, they made a festival out of a visit to a lunatic asylum. What a place for fun! He said he was glad to testify to the ability of the county judges, and hoped their names would not be forgotten. "Their names are recorded," he said, "in the corner of this building, and if I had the destiny of men they should be in heaven." Afterwards, somebody toasted "The Press," which, says the reporter of the "Cincinnati Occasion," was drunk standing and in silence! Who can wonder.

A few hours after she went down and found several rats gloriously fuddled. She engaged in throwing potato carriages and hauling one another up to drink.
