

Attempt to Abduct Saunders.

THE CONSPIRATORS ARRESTED.

MONTREAL, Aug. 8th, 1865.

Last Thursday a party of dangerous looking fellows arrived from the United States. Detective O'Leary got acquainted with them and was offered \$10,000 to assist in the abduction of Saunders. He agreed, and the plot was arranged. Detective O'Leary went last night to Saunders' house, and got him to go and see the Chief and Recorder, who live near Monklands. In driving through Priest's farm the gang rushed out, pitched O'Leary out of the carriage, gagged and handcuffed Saunders, and drove off with him. O'Leary had a vehicle at hand, and followed up. As arranged by the Chief to whom O'Leary told all the plot, constables were placed on each side of the roads, and the toll-gates were kept shut. The gang dashed through the St. Anthony gate, and Mr. Pettur, Secretary of Police, was there, he gave the alarm, and one man leaped out and fired at him. Those in the carriage also fired. He returned their shots, and the gang getting alarmed, leaped out, leaving Saunders, and ran different ways. Three were at once arrested. One of them, captured at Lachine, had a seven barreled revolver. Opposite Isle Duval were found two Indians waiting with a boat to carry the gang to Caughnawaga. They stated that they were engaged to take a party across, and were to remain concealed until they saw a signal. The constables crossed and arrested one of the conspirators at 2 o'clock in the morning. As was found in bed at Caughnawaga. He had a dagger beside him. Three others were arrested at this point at 4 o'clock while attempting to hire boats. There is as yet no evidence against them. On the four others were found photographs of Saunders, Tucker, and other Southerners here, and O'Leary identifies them all. Their names are Hogan, Burns, Clayton and Wayne. The three caught hiring the boat gave their names as Brown, Burlington, W. E. Brown, and S. S. Brown, from R. I. and Mass. They had about \$200 amongst them. They say they are horse buyers. Three valises were found in the hotel at Caughnawaga, and are supposed to belong to the gang. Hogan has been recognized as a notorious crimp and kidnapper named Charley Adams. It was intended to seize Tucker and other who have been chartered to off one who lives on the bank of the river. The following is Tetu's statement:— When I challenged, after the carriage had dashed through the toll-gate, three of the kidnappers fired on me, and Hogan having jumped down and taking deliberate aim, the four others then made for the field. I went in pursuit, and when I got on top of the fence the three fired at me, and I leaped in after them. It was a field of oats, being pretty high and the ground rough, there was no chance of taking steady aim. A constable by this time had got into the field, and the men made off, after having fired at the constable. Two of the party kept sitting for Dorchester street, sometimes stooping as they ran, and the other two were crawling through the oats, and finally escaping, making for the city. Of the other two, one had at once run in the direction of Lachine. He, on coming into the road, was apprehended. The other, after having run up the field, followed in the same direction, but seeing his comrade taken, got into the bush and escaped. Hogan was taken in a buggy, and had been driven about fifty yards behind the carriage, and was coming along at a furious rate when the firing commenced. He stopped suddenly as if stupefied and made no resistance. He will appear before the Court tomorrow. It is said that Mr. B. Devlin will defend them.

PEEL COUNTY BUILDINGS.—The plans and specifications of the county buildings are now in the hands of the clerk of the Provisional Council of Peel, and are to be inspected by all who have any curiosity in the matter, or may be desirous of tendering for the contract to erect them. We learn from those who are qualified to judge that the designs are models for that class of buildings, and reflect great credit on the skill of the architect, Mr. Kaufman. The drawings are said to be remarkable for their clearness, simplicity and precision, that no builder who understands his business can have the slightest difficulty in making a reliable estimate. We do not entertain the slightest doubt that the building, when completed, will materially advance the reputation of the talented architect, and elicit the approbation of the rate payers of the county.—Brampton Times.

THE CHINESE TAILORS OF SINGAPORE.—The tailors are a hard-working and industrious class; in one shop there are often as many as forty men seated on benches placed round three or four long tables. They work with English needle and materials, but use them in different way—sewing, as it were from them. They stitch carefully and at the same time rapidly. Many of these tailors' shops are open till midnight, but have relays of fresh workmen. The night workmen have each a very primitive and effective sort of lantern, which I think might be imitated with good effect at home. A small light only is used, but the rays are completely reflected down upon the table and cannot reach the workers eyes—indeed the room looks half in darkness, while the work on which each man is engaged is strongly illuminated. The method of sewing from the person may render the use of this sort of light more practicable, but yet I think it could be adjusted to English use.

THE LAW'S DELAY.—A few days ago a cargo of ice was imported into this country from Norway. Not having such an article in the Custom-House schedules, application was made to the treasury and to the board of trade; and after some little delay, it was decided that the ice should be entered as 'dry goods'; but the whole cargo had melted before the doubt was cleared up!
