STEAMER TRAVELLER BURNED.

NO LIVES LOST.

The occurence of another disaster to the Lake Superior line of steamers was announced telegram :-(Special despatch to the Detroit Free Press)

POYTAGE LAKE, via Marquette, Aug, 19. The steamer Traveller was burned at the dock at Eagle Harbour, Lake Superior, yes-

terday. No lives lost. A small portion the freight and furniture was saved. The steamer is a total loss.

A despatch to John Hutchings, owner of the boat, says that the fire broke out in her hold and spread with such rapidity that very little could be saved. The Traveller was one of the oldest boats in the Lake Superior line, and was of 600 tons burthen. quently came into the possession of the Chicago and Milwaukee Railroad Company. and rebuilt in 1863.
