

News in Brief.

"Fights, fires and accidents" figure conspicuously in the accounts of the celebration in New York.

The state of the crops is very unsatisfactory in many parts of Northern and Eastern Germany. Prices are beginning to rise.

A man in Illinois has invented a horseshoe which needs no nails or screw, and which, after being fitted, can be taken off and put on by any one.

GENERAL GEORGE B. McCLELLAN is said to be a candidate for the position of engineer of a Western railroad, with a salary of \$10,000 a year.

A new and cheap material for making paper is found in the esparto, or Spanish grass-hemp. It is asserted to be as good as manilla, and grows on the plain of Spain in great abundance.

CRICKET.—A match between the St. George's Club of New York and the Military Garrison of Montreal and Quebec, is announced to take place at Hoboken on September 6th and 7th.

One firm of music dealers in Chicago recently sent a single order to a New York wholesale house for five tons of musical publications. The music must have been heavy.

Another great scandal has occurred in the fashionable world of Paris. One of its most assiduous habitués has been arrested for pawing the jewels of a woman which she lent him for a fancy ball.

Saratoga statistics are becoming quite plenty. On Friday last Union Hotel entertained 1,400 people, who consumed 1,240 pounds of beefsteak, extensive quantities of other meats and 400 quarts of ice cream.

In the Saratoga list of arrivals it is customary to abbreviate the attendant of a magazine. Thus a married couple with their daughter and four horses, thus appears; Mr. and Mrs. Stubbs, 4h, 1d.

There is a fatal disease raging among horses in some parts of Pennsylvania. At first there is a swelling of the throat, followed, toward the last stages, by a swelling of the head and limbs, which proves fatal.

On Saturday last there were lying in the ports of New York forty-six steamers, ninety-four ships, one hundred and ninety barques, one hundred and thirty-nine brigs, and sixty schooners.

A foundry here to New York, according to a New Orleans paper, realizes, for a fast steamer, some twenty, thirty or forty thousand dollars net profit, and the same in proportion for up-river steamboats.

Sol Davis' stair case at Table Rock was consumed by fire on Thursday last; supposed to be the work of incendiaries. On Saturday Mr. Davis attempted by force to pass his visitors down Mr. Barnett's stair case. The attempt, however, was unsuccessful.

A company is being organized to build another Suspension Bridge across the Niagara river. It will probably be stretched from near the Cliff House to the property in the vicinity of the Niagara Falls gas works.

"When Nineveh has departed, and Palmyra is in ruins; when Imperial Rome has fallen, and the Pyramids themselves are sinking into decay, it is no wonder," sighed a French humorist, "that my old black coat should be getting seedy at the elbows."

The next novelty is to be a bull-frog show. Mr. Frank Cahill, formerly a journalist, but lately a soldier, has brought from the South a large collection of bull-frogs, which he proposes to exhibit, with a lecture illustrating the habits of the creatures.

Among the sayings attributed to Admiral Farragut is one that "you can no more make a sailor out of a landlubber by dressing him up in sea-togs and putting a commission in his pocket, than you could make a shoemaker of him by filling him with sherry cobblers.

THE HEALTH OF ALFRED TENNYSON.—Various reports in the newspapers give the impression that the Laureate is wasting away with a mortal disease. His American publishers, Messrs. Ticknor & Fields, have received recent letters from him to the effect that he is in his usual health. The reports to the contrary are unfounded.—Boston Transcript.

COLONEL PARKER, who accompanies General Grant on his travels, is a pure Scotch Indian, and a grandson to the celebrated Red Jacket, Chief of the Six Nations. He is a large, robust man, at least six feet in height. On his breast may be seen a broad silver medal presented to his ancestor by General Jackson.

JEREMIAH TOWNSEND, clerk in a Savings Bank at New Haven, Conn., who absconded last May with about \$100,000, had been cleverly captured in Liverpool by two Philadelphia detectives, on arrival at that place from Havana via Southampton. Townsend sought to use his loaded revolver when captured, but was prevented. Nearly \$99,000 of the stolen money was found in his possession. He sailed for New York in the custody of his captors, by the Etta, on the 2d.

THE London Times editorially expatiates on the difficulty of maintaining and feeding the liberated slaves of the South, and says:—"It is easy for the victorious Government, by a few words, to strike off the slaves' fetters, and dislocate and destroy the industry of the whole community, but it is not easy for it to find an answer to the awful question—Of what are the people to live?—one which has raised for itself, and which ever day more and more importantly demands an answer."

BRUTAL ASSAULT ON A LAD WITH AN AXE.—HIS LIFE DESPAIRED OF.—During the conflagration on Thursday night, a man named Giroux, armed with an axe, chased a youth of 19 years, called Begin, through several streets, until the latter reached his mother's house, when going up the stairs that led to the door, he was dealt a terrific blow with the axe by his pursuer. The wound is fully four inches in length, two of the ribs are cut through and the lungs penetrated. The unfortunate fellow is under the care of Dr. F. E. Roy and Dr. Verge, who consider his recovery almost hopeless. Giroux, who was arrested on the spot, is now in jail suffering from the effect of *Primum Irremans*. It may here be stated that Begin was a total stranger to Giroux who struck him in mistake for another.—Quebec Mercury.

HACKMEN AT THE FALLS.—The Rochester Union, alluding to the recent murder of a gentleman at Niagara Falls by hackmen, says: "It is well that all visitors to the Falls fully understand that the hackmen there are a gang of desecrated villains, whose real occupation of cutting throats and robbing strangers is concealed under the guise of hack driving. No stranger should enter a hack at the Falls alone to go anywhere, and no party of men should carry money with them when riding in that region. The hackmen are chiefly scoundrels and Buffalo thieves, who go to the falls in the summer season to rob all who fall in their way. Visitors at the Falls can see all that is to be seen without the use of hacks, unless they are invalids, and if they are, the Fall" —place for them.
