

County Court and Court of Quarter Sessions,

(From the Daily Leader.) The sittings of the above courts commenced on Tuesday, 12th inst., at 12 o'clock, the Hon. S. B. Harrison presiding; Archibald McMillan, J. P., and Thomas Graham, S. P., associates.

The following gentlemen were sworn in as grand jurors:—

Samuel Scarlett, foreman; John Clark, Thomas Crown, T. W. Chambers, George Gamble, Charles Graham, Francis Graham, J. B. Gracey, William Hawkins, James H. Harris, David McBride, Christopher Newcombe, William Dixon, T. John Reeve, Richard Rowen, Francis Seightholm, David F. Sprague, W. A. Smithson, William Sibbald, Jesse Watson, H. R. Wallace. The Grand Jury after being addressed by His Honor, retired to their room to dispose of the business to be brought before them.

The appeal list, containing ten cases, was called over twice during the day, and the appellants having failed to put in an appearance, the whole of the cases, with one or two exceptions, were struck off the list.

The civil docket contains about 60 cases, a large number of which (defendants) were disposed of and the court adjourned till Wednesday at 10 o'clock.

Wednesday, Sept. 13, 1865.

At the opening of the court this morning, not a single case but one (undefended) was ready. The docket was called over and all the cases 'footed,' and the Judge, after waiting some time, adjourned the court till this morning at 10 o'clock, at which time if counsel are not ready and in attendance he would commence to 'strike out.'

The Grand Jury came into court with true bills in the following cases:

The Queen vs. Thomas Lannigan, nuisance; the Queen vs. Hugh Travers, larceny; the Queen vs. Henry Hayward, larceny and receiving; the Queen vs. George Burns, larceny. The prisoners in all the cases except the one for a nuisance were arraigned and pleaded not guilty. Lannigan having promised the court that the nuisance would be abated, his case was allowed to stand in the meantime. The sessions were then also adjourned till this morning at 10 o'clock.

MONDAY, Sept. 18, 1865.

Before the Hon. S. B. Harrison.

DUBE vs. HENNESSY.

This was an action brought by Clement Dube, a Frenchman, against John Hennessy, an Irishman and possessor of Her Majesty. It appeared from the evidence that the plaintiff carried on a business as a grocer and provision dealer in a small way on Queen street west, in a house belonging to the defendant. Some misunderstanding arose between the parties, at a time when the plaintiff was moving out of the house and the defendant was moving in, and in consequence a row ensued, during which according to the plaintiff's witnesses, the defendant assaulted the plaintiff, and at another time assaulted his wife. This action was therefore brought to recover damages on account of the said assaults.

Verdict for plaintiff; damages \$20.

Mr. D. B. Read, Q. C., for plaintiff; Hon. J. E. Robinson for defendant.

STYVES vs. SIMS.

This was an action of replevin brought by the plaintiff against the defendant for, and on account of, an illegal distress for rent. The defendant attempted to establish a tenancy, and the fact that three months rent was due to him at the time of the seizure, but failed, and the jury gave a verdict for the plaintiff; damages \$2.

Mr. J. Boyd for plaintiff; Mr. Donora for defendant.

TUESDAY, Sept. 19, 1865.

THE QUEEN vs. JAMES MCARTHUR.

The defendant in this case was charged with having on the 30th of July last assaulted one Catherine McArthur, his wife. The charge was fully proved, and a verdict of guilty with a recommendation to mercy was recorded.

The court sentenced the defendant to be imprisoned in the common jail for one month and fined him \$1 and costs.

Mr. J. McNab for the Crown; Mr. E. Crombie for the defendant.

THE QUEEN vs. JOHN BENJAMIN DEAN.

The indictment in this case contained three counts, charging the prisoner with having shot at one James Kendrick, with intent to do grievous bodily harm, with intent to maim, and with common assault. The evidence completely failed to establish the first two counts, and the jury acquitted the prisoner on the third.

Mr. McNab for the Crown; Mr. A. McNab for the prisoner.

The price of milk in London was on Monday raised 1d., and is now 5d. per quart.

A GRAND KIXCE of Captain Cook, the great circumnavigator, died in Nile street, Sunderland, a few days ago, in her 75th year.

During the cholera panic at Barcelona nearly 10,000 people left the town in one day, although very few cases of real cholera occurred there.

The total quantity of coal raised in England, Wales, and Scotland last year, was about 96,000,000 tons; lives lost, 800—or one death to about 110,726 tons.

The restaurants of Birmingham have raised the price of all kinds of cooked meat 1d. per plate, in consequence of the advance in the price of cattle from the spread of the plague.

LOSS OF STEAMERS IN THE CHINA TRADE.—Two large steamers in the China trade, the Ialshah Rookh and the Futier, have been totally lost. Upwards of £400,000 of insurance had been effected. The steamer Hadrakon has been burnt. The crews were saved.
