

Arrival of the Cuba.

ARRESTS OF PENIANS IN IRELAND.

Great Excitement in Dublin.

HALIFAX, Sept. 26.—The steamship Cuba, Capt. Stone, which left Liverpool at 8 30 on the evening of the 16th and Queenstown on the 17th, arrived here this afternoon at four o'clock. She had on board two passengers for Halifax and 113 for Boston.

The steamship Alamo, from Halifax, and the steamship city of Cork, for New York, also left Liverpool on the 16th.

The steamship Louisiana, from New York, also left Liverpool on the 15th.

The Persia, from New York, arrived at Crookhaven at 11 30 on the evening of the 15th.

The steamship Borussia, from New York, arrived at Southampton on the 15th.

GREAT BRITAIN.

An extraordinary general meeting of the Atlantic Telegraph Company was held in London on the 8th. The directors presented a report setting forth the result of the late effort, and sanguine expectations for the future, deduced therefrom, expressing a determination to press forward with the work, and announcing that they had already entered into a contract for renewed operations.

Under this contract the telegraph construction company undertake for the sum of £500,000—that is the most cost price—to manufacture and lay down a new cable next year, and if successful, but not otherwise, to have in shares and cash, profits of 20 per cent on its cost. They also undertake, without any further charge whatever, to go to sea with sufficient cable to complete the present broken cable, and use the best endeavors to that end.

Carrying out this contract requires that the Atlantic company should raise the minimum of £250,000 to a maximum of £500,000 in cash upon which new capital, a preferential dividend of 12 per cent, is proposed, with a share in the profits of the dividends to which they are entitled to have been paid on old shares.

The report was unanimously adopted, and the question of raising the capital being left to the final decision of another meeting, to be called on the 12th of October.

The cholera has increased so much at Marseilles that the Mayor has summoned a meeting of physicians to concert measures of relief.

The weekly returns of the Bank of France show a decrease in cash of 4,500,000.

The Paris bourse on the 15th closed flat; rentes 67 4/10.

From the Cape of Good Hope late mails, date not given, have been received.

The war between the free States and the Santos was prosecuted with vigor by the Boers, who maintained the aggressive.

LONDON MONEY MARKET.

The discount demand is rather more active. The rates are unchanged. Funds are quiet and steady; but consols are slightly depressed by the introduction of the Brazilian loan.

LIVERPOOL, Saturday Evening, Sept. 16.—The Persia arrived here at nine o'clock this morning.

The Dublin Express, of this morning, says that, after the arrest at the "Irish People office" last night, orders were issued to all police stations and military barracks for men to be held ready in case of an attempt at rescue by the populace. A policeman was also stationed in each telegraph office for the purpose of stopping any message relating to Fenianism.

LATEST VIA QUEENSTOWN.

QUEENSTOWN, Sept. 17.—The Irish police continue to arrest Fenians. The number of prisoners is very large, among others a person said to be a Captain in the American army, in whose possession documents and uniform were found. On Sunday the prisoners, escorted by the mounted police, were taken to the police court to undergo examination. The result has not transpired. The mob heartily cheered the prisoners, but made no attempt at a rescue. Great excitement prevails in Dublin, and arrests are being made in other parts of Ireland.

LIVERPOOL MARKET.

LIVERPOOL, Sept. 16.—Breadstuff quiet and steady. Flour quiet and nominal. Wheat quiet and steady at 8s to 9s for spring. Corn firmer; sales of mixed at 29s 6d. Provisions quiet and steady. Beef inactive. Pork quiet and still. Bacon quiet and firm. Lard market bare and prices is higher. Petroleum firm at 2s 10d for refined.

THE CROPS OF 1865.—Mr. Turner, land agent of Richmond, Yorkshire, has made his annual report, which appears in the Times. His observation extended from the Tyne to the Thames. He is of opinion that in bulk the wheat crop is an average, but the quality greatly inferior to that of last year. In many southern counties it is unquestionably unsound. Barley is a full average. Oats are moderate. Beans and peas are average crops. Potatoes are a good crop, and turnips a full average. In the pastures there is more food for cattle and sheep than has been for years. For several weeks we shall have to depend for bread and meal upon old wheat, the stock of which is ample. In the counties of Durham and Northumberland, there are thousands of acres where the turnip crop has been utterly destroyed by fly or grub.

SUMMARINE CABLES.—In Europe, Asia, Africa, and Australia, there are 52 submarine cables which are of the aggregate length of 5625 miles, and the insulated wires of which measure 9783 miles. The longest of these is 1550 fathoms, and the shortest, 1 1/2 fathoms. There are 95 submarine cables in the United States and British North America which measure 68 miles, and their insulated wires 133 miles. The overland telegraph line between New York and the west coast of Ireland, through British Columbia, Northern Asia, and Russia, will be 20,473 miles long, 12,740 miles of which are completed. It has at length been resolved that this line shall cross from America to Asia at the southern point of Norton Sound, on the American side to St. Lawrence Island, and from thence to Cape Thadens on the Asiatic continent. Two submarine cables will be required for this, one 125 miles long, and the other 250 miles long. Cape Thadens is 1700 miles from the mouth of the Amoor river.
