

General News.

THE Hon. Preston King, collector at the port of New York, drowned himself on Monday, while in a state of temporary insanity, by jumping off a ferry-boat. He had for a week past been labouring under an attack of nervous debility. On Monday he left his room at the Astor House, and nothing more was heard of him till yesterday, when the sad truth became known. His body had not been discovered up to last night.

BURGLARY.—Another case of robbery occurred in this town on Sunday evening last, when the store of Mr. J. D. Tait, Dry Goods merchant, was entered by some robbers, and goods estimated to the value of about \$750. It appears that whilst Mr. Tait was attending divine service, the thieves entered his bedroom above his store, and obtaining possession of the keys, went below made off with articles to the amount above mentioned. No arrests have yet been made. We trust the guilty ones may be brought to justice.—*St. Catharines.*

THE EIGHT HOUR LABOR SYSTEM.—A procession numbering about 3,000, of the citizens of Washington, paraded the streets on that day a few days ago, in a demonstration of their desire to enforce the eight hour day. The parade was a grand affair, and the people were very much pleased to see the many of them being made up of men employed in the United States government workshops.

Here is another case of the thieves having adopted a new mode of stealing. A man had gone to buy a pair of shoes, and in the store he observed a pair of boots for sale, which he had seen in the window. He saw a man enter the store and go to the counter, and he saw the man take the boots and go to the door. He followed him, and saw him get into a carriage and drive away. He then went to the police and reported the matter.

THE FENIAN TRIALS.—The London correspondent of the New York Times writes severely thus:—"We propose to begin trying our Fenians about the 27th of November. If those on your side of the water are kept quiet, it will not go very hard with them. If they would abandon their organization, and sink like give up all idea of freeing Ireland from the English yoke, accepting the Union as an accomplished fact of too long standing to be disturbed, their unhappy dupes would no doubt either be set at liberty without a trial, or experience the executive clemency. It is with Col. O'Mahoney, the Head Centre, with the side, back and tail centres in America, to save their brethren in Ireland, whom they have got into this stupid difficulty."
