Duiton, the Ea dish Consul at the Cape had taken to his house a few Haytien vetugees, and Mr Saluave, the rebel chief, desired Mr. Dutton to give up these people, which was refused. whereupon the house was entered by force, and the poor fellows under his protection taken out and shot by Saluave on the sea share. The rebels then commenced to wreak vengeance on the Consul's house. smashing his furniture and taking everything they could lay their hands on. To finish the fun, they would up by pulling down the English flag, spat and stamped on it. Mr. Dutton went on board the "Bulldor," and related to the captain what had been done, who wrote to Saluave, asking what he meant Salnave replied that what he had already done was well done and aux blancs. The captain demanded satisfaction, giving Salnave twenty-four bours to think over the matter, and then left the cape. Next morn-ing the "Bulblog" returned, and on passing Fort Circlet, in the harbor, was fired into by Salnave. The rest is familiar to our readers. After dismanding Fort Circlet with one broadside, the "Bulldog" smashed up another small fort and blew up the arsen-al.
