Markham Council.

The above Council met at Unionville on Saturday, the 21st inst, at 11 a.m. Receive in the chair. Minutes all present. Members of last council were read and approved.

PETITIONS.

From H. Wilson, and others praying for a grant on Church Street, Markham Village. From Edward Wheeler, and others praying for aid to Widow Asterly a destitute person.

RESOLUTIONS.

James Robinson seconded by Mr. Fenwick moves, that a certificate to obtain a Tavern license, be granted to Mr. Robert Bell to keep the house known as the "California Hotel," 10th Concession Markham.—Carried.

Peter Wilmot, seconded by James Bowman, moves that the sum of \$7 be paid James Bliss for defraying the expenses of burying a pauper, by the name of Jane McConnell.—Carried.

Moved by A. W. Fenwick, seconded by James Robinson, that the east half of lot No. 35, in the 7th concession, and the west half of lot 35, in the 8th concession, be set apart from road division No. 49, as a separate division.—Carried.

Moved by James Robinson, seconded by Mr. Wilmot, that the sum of \$100 be granted by this Council for the repairing of the bridge over the stream on the side line between lots 25 and 26, on the 7th concession, and that A. Raymer, John Weaver, and James McConchie be commissioners to expend the same.—Carried.

Mr. Bowman, seconded by Mr. Wilmot, moves that the sum of \$100 be granted towards the erection of a bridge in the tenth concession between lots 5 and 6, and that Samuel Resor, James Train, James Boyd, James Dinama, and William Perry, be commissioners to expend the same.—Carried.

Moved by James Robinson, seconded by W. Bowman, that this Council do grant the sum of \$100 to aid in building a bridge across the creek on Church Street, in Markham Village. Yeas: Robinson and Wilmot. Nays: Bowman, Fenwick, and the Reeve.—Lost.

Moved by James Robinson, seconded by W. Bowman, that this Council do grant the sum of \$100 per week to Mrs. Asterly of Stouffville, payable to the order of Councillor for Ward No. 5.—Carried.

Mr. Fenwick, seconded by Mr. Bowman, moves that the sum of fifty dollars be granted towards taking down the hill, and fifty dollars up the flats of the route between lots 10 and 11, in the 10th concession, and that W. Forster, W. Armstrong, and John Riehl, be commissioners to expend the same.—Carried.

James Bowman moved, seconded by Mr. Fenwick, that the sum of \$500 be granted to widow Smith, payable to the order of Councillor of Ward No. 2.—Carried.

Moved by James Robinson and seconded by Mr. Fenwick, that the sum of \$20 be granted to purchase tile and for the purpose of constructing a drain up the centre of the turnpike through the village of Unionville, north of the rouge, and that John Joyce, G. M. Davidson, and H. P. Crosby be commissioners to expend the same.—Carried.

Moved by James Robinson and seconded by Mr. Wilmot that the sum of \$15 be granted to purchase tile for the purpose of constructing a drain up the centre of the turnpike on the hill opposite lot No. 10, in the 8th Concession, and that Joseph Marr, John Jerman, and A. Barbar, be commissioners to expend the same.—Carried.

Mr. Bowman introduced a By-law to appoint Township Officers for the current year, which was passed by the Council.

To the great thickness of the substantial double floor, which prevented the flames from reaching the inside; and to the fact of the stone foundation wall confining them beneath the one building, the success of the efforts put forth is in no mean degree attributable.

Most of the common school furniture is a total wreck. The seats and desks being fixed, had to be wrenched out, and suffered the usual violence in the operation.

The Grammar School furniture suffered severely also. An anxious desire to serve and save, doubtless prompted its unnecessary removal, which was effected almost as soon as the crowd assembled, and before there could have been any positive immediate danger.

Too much cannot be said in praise of the general hearty good will with which all parties worked to quench the flames. As usual, the women rendered invaluable service, in carrying water. But for them, the supply could not have been kept up or the fire arrested so speedily.

We cannot conclude these remarks, however, without censuring the wild excitement which some—no matter of what sex, deem it necessary to indulge in, on an occasion like this, and which they manifest by all sorts of hideous and confusing noises, and by circulating the most dangerous exaggerations—dangerous, we say, because they prompt to extreme measures, for which there is no real necessity, and by which much property is destroyed, in its salvation from a danger which exists principally in their own heated imaginations.

The origin of the fire is uncertain but in all probability it arose from the soot falling down the flue, and igniting the floor. The loss which will amount to over \$400 is well covered by insurance. All the departments are again in full operation.—The junior and Grammar Schools in their own buildings and the senior department in Mr. Cook's Hall, where it will remain till the School House is refitted.

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Another Fire. ALMOST A CALAMITY.

About 7 o'clock on Monday evening last a fire broke out in the senior department of the common School, in this village, and for a time seriously threatened the entire destruction of the whole set of buildings.

When first discovered, quite accidentally by a son of the Rev. Mr. Dick, the smoke was issuing in dense volumes from beneath the floor, and had already burst through in the north end, and partly consumed a portion of the furniture.

Although a large crowd collected in a very few minutes, very little could be done to check the flames, for some time on account of the suffocating smoke, the darkness, and the difficulty of moving about among the seats, and of breaking through the double floor; but as soon as the furniture was torn out, and the floor broken through along the track of the fire (which seems to have started at the north end, near the flue), and swept across the centre, by prodigious efforts it was held in check until the arrival of Elgin Mills Engine.

This having speedily arrived thanks to the pedestrian muscles of a few of the young men, of our Village, who made a splendid run for it to the Elgin Mills, the whole foundation was quickly quenched, and the flames extinguished. As it was impossible however, to force the water beneath all parts of the building, from the outside or through the holes in the floor, it was found necessary to tear the latter almost completely up in order to be certain that no smouldering embers remained in the corners.

The trial occupied the greater part of two days, there being a number of witnesses examined on both sides, those on the part of the plaintiff swearing that it was known for weeks prior to the plaintiff leaving for the States that he was going on a visit to his friends and would return in three weeks.

The evidence for the defendant was that the plaintiff had no property that would cause his return to Canada, and that he had said that he was going to Paris unknown; and one witness swore that the plaintiff had informed him (the witness) that he never would pay the defendants what he owed them.

THE QUEEN VS. THOS. W. HENRY. The prisoner who had been arraigned some days since and pleaded not guilty to two charges of forgery, was put in the dock for trial. On being asked whether he was ready for trial, he asked leave to withdraw his plea of not guilty and pleaded guilty. Sentence deferred.

HESSIAN VS. PROPERCK, et al. Counsel for the plaintiff, Mr. R. A. Harrison and Mr. Scott; for the defendants, Mr. D. McMichael.

The plaintiff, a confectioner residing in Toronto, brought this action to recover \$382 being the amount claimed to be due for goods sold and delivered to the defendants who are confectioners in the city of Ottawa.

There was no dispute as to the sale and delivery of the goods. The question at issue was whether a partnership existed between Frederick and William Proderick. Plaintiff endeavored to establish a partnership, while the defendant, William Proderick denied the existence of a partnership between himself and Frederick, and held that the goods were sold to Frederick alone whose note the plaintiff had.

Verdict for the plaintiff \$402. Friday, April 20. REID VS. REID. Counsel for the plaintiff Mr. D. McMichael, for the defendant, Mr. E. A. Harrison.

This action was against the defendant as administratrix of the late Wm. Reid, and was brought on an award made in the plaintiff's favor for \$140, which the defendant refused to pay, and a denial of making of the submission, and that the award was bad. It was given in evidence that the late Wm. Reid, and the plaintiff (Wm. Reid) had carried on business as a copartners in the Village of Sharon, that after the death of William, his widow took out letters of administration, and that upon an attempt being made to settle the partnership business, the plaintiff advanced a claim against the estate for rent, and salary for himself. A dispute arising, it was suggested that the matter in dispute should be referred to John Reid, but no submission bond was drawn up.

The arbitrator acting on the request, prepared and made his award in writing without having any evidence either on the part of the plaintiff or defendant, and awarded the sum of \$840 to the plaintiff. Verdict for the defendant.

The grand jury ignored the bills against James Reynolds, who was charged with the crime of arson, and Donald Mathewson on a charge of larceny.

HESEKEL VS. WARD. Counsel for the plaintiff, D. B. Read, Q. C.; for the defendant, Mr. D. McMichael.

This was an action on a judgment recovered in England against the defendant. The necessary documents and an exemplification of the judgment under the seal of the court being put in a verdict was entered for the plaintiff in \$2,136.

HEKINSON VS. LAWRENCE. Counsel for the plaintiff, Mr. T. H. Ball; for the defendant, Mr. D. McMichael.

This was an action of ejectment to recover or possession of a farm in the township of Caledon. The plaintiff claimed to recover under a lease from the defendant.

The defence set up was that the plaintiff had deserted the premises, and that the property was going to waste, the defendant applied to three magistrates, who, acting under an old statute of George the second, placed the defendant in possession.

Verdict for defendant subject to the opinion of the court. The court adjourned till Monday morning at 10 o'clock.

MONDAY, April 23rd, 1866. PETERMAN VS. BALDWIN. Counsel for the plaintiff, D. B. Read, Q. C.; for the defendant, Mr. Thomas Ferguson.

In this action the plaintiff claimed to recover damages from the defendant for maliciously suing out a writ of attachment against his estate, under the Insolvent Act of 1864. The defendant had, in November last, obtained an ex parte order of Judge Harrison for the issue of a writ of attachment against the plaintiff, upon which a writ was accordingly issued, and the estate and effects of the plaintiff placed in the hands of the guardian in insolvency. The writ was subsequently set aside by the learned judge, on the ground that the estate of the plaintiff had not been subject to compulsory liquidation, and his decision was affirmed by the Court of Chancery on an appeal by the defendant. The plaintiff claimed to recover damages for the seizure and detention of his goods under the writ, and for the expenses of the same.

Verdict for the plaintiff, \$500.

County Assizes.

From the City Deltas.

(The Hon. W. H. Draper, C.B., Chief Justice, presiding.) ROWE VS. FITCH et al. Counsel for the plaintiff, Mr. R. A. Harrison; for the defendants, Mr. D. McMichael.

The plaintiff was a merchant doing business in the township of King, near Aurora. In the summer 1865 he gave up business and assigned the greater portion of his property, being at the time indebted to the defendants. After making the assignment he went to the United States, as he alleged on a visit. During his absence one of the defendants, J. C. Fitch sued out a writ of attachment and attached a span of horses, an organ and some other property.

The plaintiff returned in a few weeks, and brought this action to recover damages, on the ground that the defendants had acted maliciously in making the affidavit and suing out the writ of attachment.

The trial occupied the greater part of two days, there being a number of witnesses examined on both sides, those on the part of the plaintiff swearing that it was known for weeks prior to the plaintiff leaving for the States that he was going on a visit to his friends and would return in three weeks.

The evidence for the defendant was that the plaintiff had no property that would cause his return to Canada, and that he had said that he was going to Paris unknown; and one witness swore that the plaintiff had informed him (the witness) that he never would pay the defendants what he owed them.

Verdict for the defendant.
