 A GIANT RADISH.—The *Pall Mall Gazette* says—"The last new thing in vegetables is really quite a startling wonder. Think of a radish with seedpods about three feet long, and sometimes growing five or six inches in four-and-twenty hours. We can think of nothing like it except Jack's immortal beanstalk, which, as the legend has it, was nevertheless not spoken of as good to eat, whereas this radish is said to be as palatable as it is monstrous. The plant comes from Java, but we are told that it has been fairly tried in the open ground in England, and succeeds perfectly well. To add to its merits, its pods are ready for use less than three months after the seed is sown."

THE BRITISH UNION JACK.—The Union Jack, that "Meteor Flag of England," is now a combination of the Crosses of S. S. George, Andrew, and Patrick, which combined represent the three kingdoms united under the sway of the Crown of England. The original Union Jack was formed of the Crosses of S. S. George and Andrew, and declared to be the national ensign by James I. on the union of the Kingdoms of England and Scotland. But at the beginning of the present century, 1801, when Ireland was united to the Kingdom of Great Britain, it became necessary to add the Cross of St. Patrick. The present Jack is biazoned as follows:—"On a field azure, the cross saltire of St. Andrew argent, surmounted by that of St. Patrick gules, over all the cross of St. George fimbriated of the second. The union jack is only used on flags, except on the shield placed by the side of the figure of Britannia (where two 'S's for Britannium on the copper coins, but only one on the silver on the pennies and half-pennies. It was granted as an honorable augmentation to the late Duke of Wellington to be borne on a shield of pretence. The term Jack is supposed to have originated from *Jaque*, the French words for James, the monarch who first ordered its use.
LOCOMOTION.—Traveling clears the mind from the stains contracted in our everyday labors, as washing purifies the body. A certain degree of sluggishness is inseparable from a skin impervious to dirt. The perspiration and belches with some heat that abstemious who lives for months in one form, washing saves not only soap, but clothing, lives also contentedly in the same corner of the same hut for days and months. He never feels the want of locomotion. Whatever may be the physiological explanation of the fact, a man with a clean and healthy skin generally finds continuance in one place unbearable. A German who leads comparatively torpid existence does not require to freshen himself up either by unnecessary clearing, or by change of place; he likes to let the dust accumulate. He is evidently an adept in the art, the whole affair being managed silently and with consummate skill. The inn was not closed till midnight, but when Mr. Hever went out shortly after daylight, not the slightest trace of mare, rogue, harness, buffalo robe, or buggy could be seen.
