Austria in offering to cede this part of her possession to France has acted with good policy, she would be rid of a province which she kept under difficult circumstances, and perhaps would secure a friend in the Emperor.

Had Austria turned it over to Italy at the breaking out of hostilities she might have had one if not two enemies the less to contend with, for Italy would be unlikely to have engaged in the war when her demands were complied with, as her people dislike the Prussians full as much as they do the Austrians.

The Council met at Size's Hotel Unionville, on Saturday the 28th July. Reeve in the Chair.

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved. The question concerning the damage done by the recent flood was taken up and after considerable discussion it was decided that each Councillor should have repaired as soon as possible, the damage done in his Ward.

From the St. Catharines Journal, June 30. How Col. Dennis ran and Disguised Himself.

The correspondent of the Detroit Tribune, claims to have been in the night at Longstone Ridge and also at Port Erie at the time of the landing of the Welland Canal Field Battery and Dunville Naval Brigade, and to have been an eye witness of what there transpired. He says:—

Col. J. Stoughton Dennis, of the Queen's Own accompanied that organization to Ridgeway, we believe, on the morning of Sunday June 2nd, but Col. Booker, being the ranking officer, took command. Col. Dennis proceeded from Port Colborne on board the tug Robt., to Port Erie village, and assumed command at that place.

In the afternoon, when our correspondent saw and conversed with Col. Dennis on the dock at Port Erie, he appeared to be the happiest mortal living, and one might think he was considering what disposition was best to put the prisoners—whether to serve them up raw or cooked to the hungry volunteers, or whether he had not better read the riot act to them and then hang them up to dry.

Col. Dennis is evidently 'some on strategy' and the result will show that this theory is correct. On Saturday afternoon, June 2nd, it will be remembered that a straggling body of Fenians, numbering, probably 150, swooped down upon the garrison at Port Erie, where Col. Dennis was in command.

All the time the Fenian bullets were coming this and fast towards the volunteers who were compelled to seek refuge in Mrs. Lewis's house. Previous to the skirmish, there had been a large boat load of spectators landed from Buffalo, and many were exposed to the flying bullets of both parties.

A wounded volunteer strayed into the house and was afforded shelter. He was carried up into the garret, his wound dressed, and every comfort shown him. The garret in the house had just emerged from the street after attending to the wounded man, when a squad of Fenians came along and inquired if there were any British soldiers in the place.

In the meantime, Messrs Lanning and Coombs went into Thomas's barn, and while there their attention was attracted by a noise in the hay mow. Upon looking up they saw the head of a human being protruding from a quantity of hay.

Man in the hay—[Trembling]—Gentle men, are you Fenians, you know? Party—No, sir, we are Americans who came here for protection from the Fenians. Who are you? Man in the hay—My name is Dennis, Col. Dennis, and I want to be helped out of this, you know.

By the Atlantic Cable.

New York, Aug. 8.—The morning papers have the following despatch by the Atlantic cable:— LONDON, SUNDAY, AUG. 5.—Before the armistice had been extended to Bavaria, the Prussian army had moved rapidly and secured a good footing. They are forcing a paper currency upon the people.

The Baden troops left it yesterday, and the Wurtemberg troops will leave it on the 8th inst. The river Rhine is re-opened. Since the signing of the truce, part of the Swiss troops which have been guarding the border were disbanded.

The Italian navy is to be reorganized. The Count of Admiral Pisano, who recently commanded the Italian fleet, is progressing. A new Italian loan of 350,000,000 livres has been ordered. The cholera is increasing in England.

Terrible Explosion at Bradford.—BRADFORD, AUGUST 8.—At twelve minutes to two this afternoon, the west boiler in Bradford Bridge Saw Mill, owned by Thompson Smith, Esq., Toronto, exploded, killing the fireman, John Mulligan, and seriously injuring the other two men; one named Ferguson, and the others named their recovery. The mill building and machinery are total wreck.

Escape from Gaol and Rearrest.—About four o'clock, on Sunday afternoon, a man named George Hayward, confined in Gaol for horse-stealing, escaped, taking with him a quantity of prison clothing in payment of the work performed during the ten months incarcerated there. The prisoner being a quiet and inoffensive fellow, had worked himself into the confidence of the keepers, obtaining the privileges of the yard without a guard while giving assistance on the premises.

Terrible Death.—One day lately, near Orlenville, a colored man named Wm. Floyd, aged about seventy years, while employed at Mr. Schooley's steam saw mill, as night watchman, was caught by the circular saw, and so fearfully mutilated that he died in seven hours after. After the deceased was buried, the grave was open at night by some sacrilegious wretches, the head cut off and carried away, and the body left exposed to view in the open grave.—Free Press.

Extensive Fire.—A fire broke out on Monday evening, at 8:20 o'clock, in the foundry of Mr. David Bruce, situated on Furber street between Talbot and Queen. It is supposed that it originated about the engine. Mr. Bruce was in the foundry half an hour previous to the fire, and all appeared safe. The building is a frame one, and the fire spread rapidly; at one time it was thought that it would be entirely consumed.
