The County Auditor# Again!

When we asked the County Auditors for information, by which we would be enabled to understand the reason why there was a difference between the amount of the County Accounts, as audited by Messrs Jackson and Graham, for the year 1864, and the Return from the Clerk of the Counties of York and Peel to Mr. Langton, the Government Auditor we expected that they would give a satis. factory explanation. We regret to say, notwith standing the pretentious " highfalutin" of the Era, that the difference still remains unexplained,—it may be that Messrs Jackson and Graham have a peculiar system of auditing, by which they can reconcile the two conflicting statements, but we confess it is more than we can do, and we have reason to knew that there are hundreds of the rate payers in these counties who labour under the same difficulty.

The Era of the 31st ult. cudgels us. after his usual fashion, for not comprehending what he makes as clear as mud; he accuses us of a want of "manlines or courage," and that we are "obtuse," because we honestly differ from him.
