

ROYAL JEWELS .- Messrs. Wharia & Co. have at considerable expense procured and are exhibiting in their establishment on King street, fac eimiles of the principal regal diamonds in the world. The collection embraces representations of the twelve largest known diamonds as they are exhibited in the royal cabinets of England, France, Russia, Poland, Austria, Tuscany, and Egypt. The largest is the Grand Mongol of Russia. It was found in 1550 at Cologue, and then weighed 900 carets. It has been reduced nearly two-thirds by cutting, and may be valued at \$4,000-000. The shape is semi-oval, with a great number of sides on the conical surface. On either side of the Grand Mongol is the famous Kohinoor, or mountain of light, owned by Her Brittanic Majesty; the one as it was seen at the Great Exhibition at London, the other as it was subsequently re-cut by skillul Datch artists under the supervision of Messrs. Garrard of London, to
