THE ANGLO-AFRICAN WAR.

The preparations for the Abyssinian campaign had fairly begun. On Monday, the 25th of August, the departments in Woolwich Arsenal received instructions from the War Department to occupy themselves in the arrangements for furnishing the expedition which is to be despatched from India with the slightest possible delay.

It is reported that the Viceroy of Egypt had been requested to provide five thousand camels for the necessary transport of the British troops.

As an IRISH BENEVOLENT.—The Bishop of Cashal has collated the Rev. Thomas Rottwell, M. A., curate of Thurles, to the vicarage of Jerrygrath, in the diocese of Lismore. The benefice, which is worth 2172 a year, has in it a population of 787, of whom 13 are members of the Church of England, and 774 Roman Catholics.

Washington, Sept. 9.—The latest intelligence from Omer Pasha with respect to the peace negotiations, and states he obtained excellent reports of some of his fellow soldiers, denying reports of the Sultan's agents.

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THE PARIS papers record a case of suicide, in which a youth of twenty killed himself by running several dozens of pins into his chest, and died from loss of blood. He left a letter on his table, saying that he was not worth a pin, and that he had adopted this unusual mode of terminating it because he thought it piquant.

A Florence letter of the 6th in the Steele says:—"The desertions from the Pontifical army continue. Two Prussian gunners, fugitives from that corps, arrived here yesterday. If serious events should break out in the patrimony of St. Peter, no one knows to what point the Government could count on the fidelity of the native troops."

According to recent statistics, the total number of Jews in the world is 7,000,000, 3,500,000 of whom reside in Europe. It is remarkable that, in such countries as France, England, and Belgium, where the Jews are under no disabilities, they are less numerous than in countries where they have not yet been placed on an equality with the members of other creeds.

A RAILWAY TRAIN TRUCK INTO A MANTRAP.—A branch in the Madras Presidency runs through a wild region, the inhabitants of which are unsophisticated savages addicted to thievery. The first day that the line was opened a number of these Arcadians conspired to intercept the train and have a glorious loot.
