PAY OF BRITISH MINISTERS -The Washngton correspondent of the World says:— It is understood that the delay in filling the acaney at Washington, caused by the sudden and regretted death of Sir Frederic Bruce, Her Brittanic Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary, was caused by a slight pecuniary circumstance. The diplomatic representatives of the United Kingdom are variously remunerated according to the relative importance of the country to which they are accredited. Thus the Minister to France receives £10,-000 a year; to Austria. Turkey, and China, £8,000: to the United States, £4,500: to Brazil and Portugal, £4,000; and so on, gruduating lower according to the diminish ed relative standing of each country. In consequence of the greatly augmented cost of living in Washington during and since the war, the British Ambasador to the United States has with difficulty been able to live upon his official salary. It was felt that it would be unfair to promote Mr. Thornton from Portugal to the United States, that is, from £4,000 to £4,500 a year, when the said £4.500 would not go so fer in Washing ton as two-thirds of that amount would go in Lisbon. The desire to place Mr. Thronton, usually considered a very safe as well as sa gacious dip omatist, as Queen Victoria's representative in the United States, and the fact that the importance of the mission of this country has very greatly and rapidly increased of late years, has led, we are inform ed, to an augmentation of the British Minis ter's salary here from £4,500 to about £6, 600 per annum.
