ASSASSINATION HON. T. D. McGEE.

MORE EVIDENCE AGAINST WHELAN.

OTTAWA, April 11. Further evidence against Whelen was discovered to-day by detective Cullen. He found out that the house adjoining Mc Kenna's (nearly opposite Mrs. Trotter's) has been for a long time unoccupied; that he doors have been left lying open; and that in the back door steps two tracks and two and confident as ever. He looks paler, and only could be traced. They were those of a man who entered and left the house by that way. Both boot-marks corresponded precisely on being measured carefully, and Whelan's boots having been procured from the gaol were found to fit exactly in the bootmarks in the snow. When asked for his boots thismorning, Whe an sighed and was evidently upset, but said those we e not the boots he re on the night of McGee's murder. If Whelan committed this murder, and of that the authorities have hardly the least doubt, then his sudden disappearance immediately after would be readily accounted for. He could pass through the untenanted building directly on to Wellington street, and two minutes' walk would bring him to Russell's, where he was seen immediately after the muider.

It is said to be capable of proof that after the debate on Monday night. Whelan was observed in one of the passages, partly behind a pillar as if w tching some one.

THREE MORE ARRESTED.

Three more men were arrested to day on suspicion, but there is little against them. They are, I believe, descriters from Montreal. There have been a number of strange suspicious looking pe sons added to the po u lation of the city this week. They are under the survei ence of the authorities. Mr. McGee instantly recognized Whelan, and said they had met be bore in his late brother's house. There was no hesitation or reservation in the prisoner's manner at all. He was well dressed, having got a change of clothes since he was examined at the Police Court, and throughout the in terview to-day, which scarcely lasted over five minutes. Wha en's demeanor was as bold is certainly more nervous then when I saw him last: but for this his term of confine ment, short as it has been, must be held partly accountable. He was cheerful once or twice, and to Mr. O'Reilly, who, with the exception of Mr. McGee, was the only person allowed to speak to him, prisoner spoke of his trial as a matter which he had no doubt would occur, and said he wished to procure the services of an able coursel, and desired if possible Mr. John Hillyard Cam eron should be retained for the defence, as he Whelan felt the charge against him to he of the most serious character. As to his present position, in point of comfort, he said he did not expect more when he was con fined, and had no complaint to make. Other persons who were present at this interview will now be able to add important evidence to the great weight of te-timony bearing against Whelan. These persons identified him to-day as the same man whom they saw in the gallery of the House of Commons or the Wednesday evening preceeding the murder, and as having then in his possession a pistol. It was in the breast pocket of his coat, and the fact of his carrying arms there caused some remark among those persons at the time; and since then it occurred to them that possibly it might have been Whelan they saw. In this as I have told you they ound to-day they were correct. As to Mr. John McGee's wishing to see Whelan, it arose in this way-last New wished to see Mr. McGee. For some time before, in the case of persons not well known there were orders given in Mr. McGee's household that they were not to be shown up to him until an interview was had with some other member of the family. This precau

tion was taken in consequence of the threat which had been for some time previously made against Mr. McGe 's life. On the day in question the man who called was shown up stairs to Mr. Jno. DEATH OF MIKE MURPHY .- This notorious idividual died at Buffalo on Saturday last of consumption. Fo: some time past he ha been in a falling state of health, and signs of his early dissolution were so apparent that his mother, who is a blind invalid, with other relatives, went over on Thursday last to at tend his death hed. The deceased was well known in this city some few years ago as an azitator on a small sca e. He was arrested by the Government at Prescott in 1865 while on the road to join the party that led the Fenian fiasco on the Maine frontier in the spring of that year. Being sent to Cornwall goal, it was mable to hold him, and he es caped with a number of his co patirots abou a year afterwards. Of all the party that the escaped, only Marphy, the leader of the paty, kept sufficiently long in the public mine to be remembered now. He subsequently started a tavern in Buffalo, the remainder have not been publicly heard of since. Body Exhumed for Legal Investigation.

At length the authorities have determined upon enquiring into the cause of the late Mrs. Peter Basingtwait's death. about the 22nd December last, under circumstances which caused considerable comment; it created a strong suspicion that a foul crime had been committed, and was being smothered by parties who should know better; this being the im-N.B. REGISTERED LETTERS will pression upon the minds of nearly every equire to be handed in 15 minutes before person in the neighborhood, and as the authorities had reason to believe that there was something wrong, Mr. Coroner Reid of Thornhill summoned a jury, ordered the body of Mrs. Basingtwaite to be exhumed, and a post mortem examination to be held by two eminently qualified practitioners. The inquest was opened at 7 o'clock in the evening of Tuesday last, and important evidence taken, after which an adjournment was ordered until Friday the 24th inst.

After empannelling the following gentlemen as jurymen, Coroner Reid proceeded with the investigation: Messrs M. Teefy, J. Hamilton, J. Newton, sen. J. Playter, R. Robinson, A. McBeth, W. Pogue, D.
