### AMERICAN NEWS.

DISASTROUS EARTHQUAKE.

New York, Sept. 13,-Letters from Peru state that an earthquake commenced at 5:30 m. on the 13th August, extending from Bolivia to the southern ports of Chili, on the coast, and over one hundred miles inland. l'owns and cities mentioned in despatches vere literally rained, as all buildings that were not descroved were so badly damaged as to require demolition for prodential reasons All public edifices in Arica were destroyed, icluding Custom House, which contained more than \$1.000,000 worth of goods, all of which were lost.
